Season subscriptions for the Players' summer schedule were sold out last week and only a few remained today at the box office for "All My Sons". Pres. Gerald Hiken said he also revealed that more than 40,000 persons saw the Players' five 1947-48 plays.

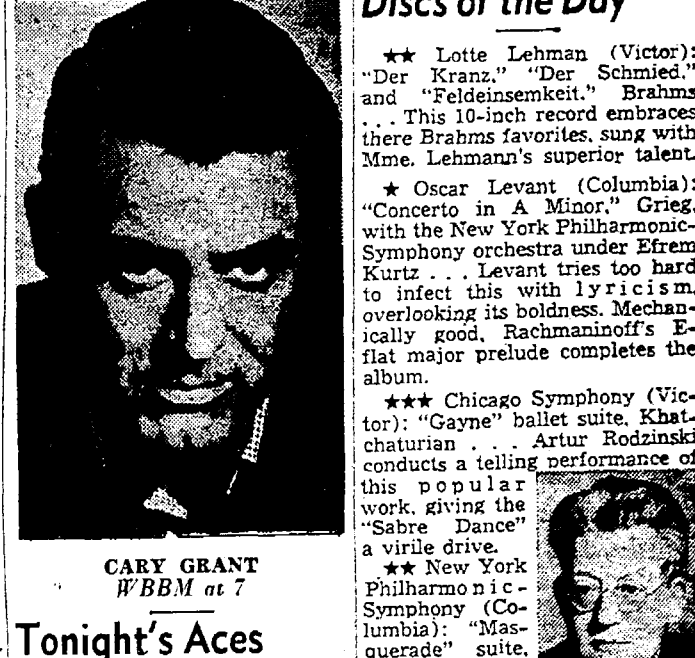

★ Lotte Lehman (Victor): "Der Kranz," "Der Schmiel," and "Feldensmkeit." Brahms... This 10-inch record embraces three Brahms favorites, sung with Mme. Lehmann's superior talent. ★ Oscar Levant (Columbia): "Concerto in A Minor," Grieg, with the New York Philharmonic-Symphony orchestra under Efram Kurtz... Levant tries too hard to infect this with lyricism, overlooking its boldness. Mechanically good, Rachmaninoff's brilliant major prelude completes the album. ★★ Chicago Symphony (Victor): "Gayne" ballet suite, Khat-chaturian... 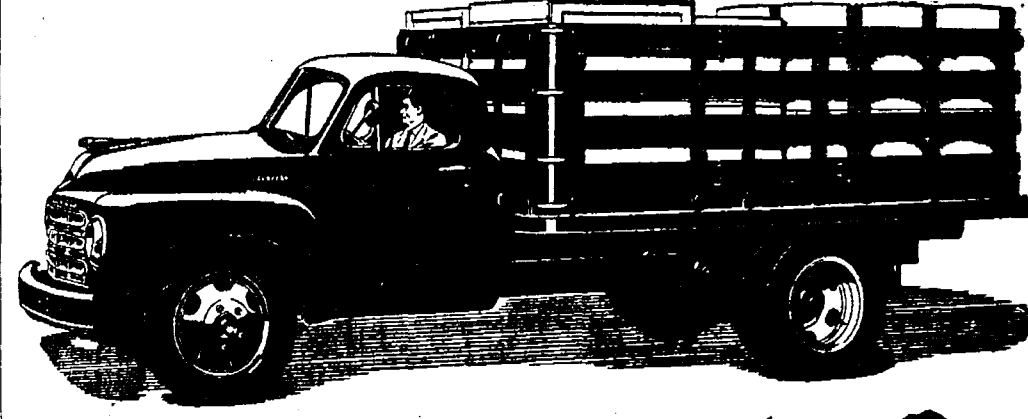
"Buttons," the fox terrier appearing in "The Emperor Waltz," is insured for \$25,000 by Rudd and Rudder Weatherwax, his owners.
