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Painful Migraine Headache

PERIODIC attacks of excruciating headache on one side of the head preceded by flashes of light before the eyes and accompanied by nausea and vomiting, add to the condition known as migraine one of the most perplexing of all medical puzzles.

Dozens of theories have been advanced to explain its peculiar behavior but evidence is lacking to support many of them and none has led to a completely successful treatment. Experts of more than 70 years ago believed migraine to be due to spasm of the blood vessels in the brain and, even today, this theory is still favored by some. Our constantly expanding knowledge of allergy has led to the idea that migraine may be due to over-sensitivity and it is also suggested that some disturbance of the glands of internal secretion may play a role in producing this disease. Vitamin deficiencies have also been proposed as a cause.

Thorough Examination

Sometimes a thorough examination will reveal the source of the trouble in the individual case and here treatment can be directed at preventing the recurrent bouts of headache altogether. In the vast majority of cases, however, no definite cause can be found, hence, treatment can only be useful in stopping the attack as soon as possible after it develops.

For this purpose, the most helpful preparation seems to be one known as ergotamine tartrate. Drugs which dilate the blood vessels and which pain-relieving drugs do not seem to be of much value.

In using the ergotamine it is important that it be given in sufficient dosage as early in the course of an attack as possible.

A derivative of ergotamine, known as dihydro-ergotamine methanesulfonate or DHD-45 has also been employed with good results.

Recent Treatment

A more recent treatment consists of the giving of a combination of ergotamine tartrate with caffeine, by mouth, or by giving it combined with a soporific in a suppository which is administered through the rectum. It has been found that either of these treatments has been more effective in relieving the migraine than the ergotamine alone.

During an attack the patient should be put at complete rest in bed preferably in a darkened room.

The drugs mentioned above should of course be administered under the direction of a physician.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

H M What is the danger of an enlarged heart? Is it serious?

Answer: When a heart is enlarged it indicates that the heart has been damaged often as a result of an infection or possibly from a toxic poison or hardened arteries.

Whether or not the condition is serious depends on the degree of enlargement and its cause.

A thorough study should be made to determine the exact condition of the heart then proper treatment can be advised.

Points on Patching Plaster

If you have ever been called on the carpet by the Internal Revenue Bureau for failing to list a few items of income on your tax form you probably know that there are an awful lot of things in this world that you have to remember. Now when it comes to patching plaster walls and ceilings there are a few very important items that you've just got to keep in mind. For example when you patch a crack the opening must be cut out so that the inside is deeper than the outside. This makes a little key that will keep the patch from falling out. Another thing to keep in mind is that when you put in a large patch the old plaster must be removed from between the lath so that the new stuff can get behind them. And the edges of the old plaster around the area to be filled should be cut back down at an angle to form a key. An important item is to wet down the edges of the old plaster so that it won't absorb all the water from the patch before the patch has set. If the water is absorbed then the patch will not harden properly. Something else you might as well keep in mind is that plaster will shrink a little when it hardens so if you wet the patch to be flush with the old plaster it must be applied under two coats. The first coat goes on until you are about 1/8 inch below the old surface. Leave this coat until it is hard and then when it is hard and has done all the shrinking it plans to do apply the final finish coat.

McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

THIS HAND STUMPED EVEN THE EXPERTS

Do you become a little bit discouraged when you misplay a hand? You shouldn't, because misplays can improve your game. Remember too that the experts blow many a hand. When today's hand was played four of the country's greatest card players were at the table and at least eight Life Masters were kibitzing. When an expert misplays a hand the others are quick to tell him about it but not one of them noticed that this contact could have been made.

East wins the opening lead of the deuce of spades with the ace and returns the queen of clubs. The correct play is not to win this club trick with the ace, but to let the queen hold. When East continues with the three of clubs, South should win with the ace which will drop the king. West discards a diamond, East wins with the jack and leads a small spade which dealer trumps with the five of clubs and if West makes the mistake of trumping, South will over trump on dummy, pick up the trumps and make his contract. If West refuses to trump, declarer keeps down one trump, losing two clubs a spade and the long heart.

Later in the evening one of the experts who had been thinking about the hand told South how he could have made it. Instead of leading the ten of clubs at trick four and letting East win it with the jack he should have led a small heart to dummy. West would have won with the king of hearts but he could not return a club. Declarer would win either a heart or diamond return in dummy, lead the ten of spades and discard the ten of clubs. Then he could pick up West's four trumps and make the contract.

It is true that if declarer had won the queen of clubs with the ace at trick two and then picked up the trumps, he could have made the hand. But this would not have been correct percentage play because it would work only when the clubs are divided king and one.

THE HOUSE BY THE SEA, by Jon Godden (Rinehart)

Edwina Marsh, a large clumsy self-conscious spinster, never had a chance. She dreams of the childhood that was dominated by her father and of life with her dominating friend Madge, but it is only on the opening page of this novel that at 40 she manages to be alone, and on her own.

This is happiness here on the bleak Cornwall shore in the house which now that her father is dead she can call her own. It's her first night, she has lighted every lamp looked through all four rooms, done everything but peek under the bed, and yet as Madge had predicted, she is obliged to confess that she is afraid.
