Q. What is the name of the theater where farm produce can be exchanged for tickets of admission? W. D. D.

A. It is the Barter Theater of Virginia, which was established by Robert Porterfield in Abingdon in 1933, became the State Theater of Virginia in 1946 and now is the largest professional stage organization outside New York and the only traveling repertory company in the coun-try. 




