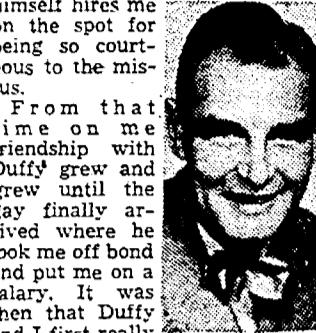
Meyer replied, "Look — everybody knows you've got money! I have to prove I've got some!"

Wall Street word on Robert R. Young is that since the ICC refused him the right to establish a unified trans-continental rail system, he'll give Hollywood more of his time and money.

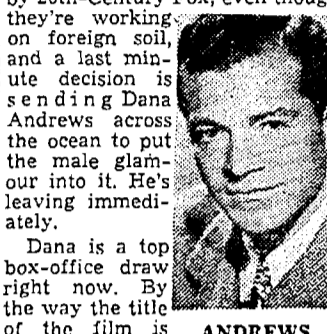
