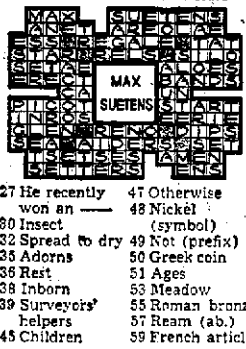

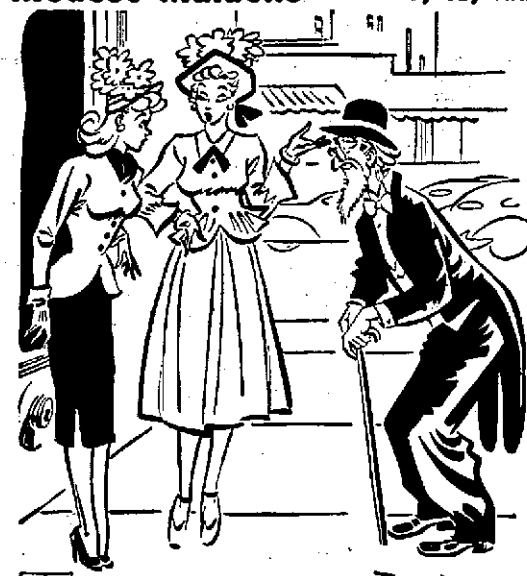

Psychological test questions: 1. IS THE NOTION TRUE THAT TEEN-AGERS ARE ESPECIALLY CHANGEABLE... 2. WHAT MAKES AN OTHERWISE HONEST MAN GO WRONG AND EMBEZZLE? 3. DO THE SHAPE OF YOUR HANDS AND LINES IN THE PALMS TELL ANYTHING ABOUT YOUR PERSONALITY AND INTELLIGENCE?

Answers to Question No. 1 No, apparently. Ohio U. psychologists Thompson and Horrocks had 1874 city and country boys and girls, age 11-15, name their "three best friends" (same sex) and two weeks later again name their three best. From 11 to 14 only 50 per cent selected the same friends both times; from 15 to 18, 60 to 90 per cent selected the same ones, indicating teen-age is a period of growing stability in forming friendships and not a period of "storm and stress," and changeableness.
