

Q. What provision has been made under the new draft law for young men who are planning to enter college in the fall?-

The Selective Service Act provides that any person who, while satisfactorily pursuing a while satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course of instruction at a college, university, or similar institution of learning is ordered to report for induction under this title, shall, upon facts presented to the local board, have his induction under this title postponed (a) until the end of such scademic year or (b) until he ceases satisfactorily to pursue such course of instruction, whichever is earlier. whichever is carlier.

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

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
