

Red Sox Win Ninth Straight as Ted Williams Rejoins Team

NEW YORK (U.P.)—Who said the Red Sox didn't have any pitching depth?

Well, Manager Lou Boudreau of Cleveland was one gent who did, yet today as his team's lead pitcher appeared in Boston for his ninth straight game, it looked like the Red Sox might be deep enough in pitching to inundate the Indians.

The merry men of Marse Joe McCarthy, riding a nine-game winning streak, had eight different winning pitchers during the stretch. The only man to win two games was Micky Harris (the hefty pitcher) who until last week was considered the number one liability on the staff.

Red Sox Near Lead

Brewers Win, 7-2, to Maintain Lead

The Milwaukee Brewers retained their slim lead in the Red Hot American Association pennant fight Friday night by Downing St. Paul, 7-2, while runner-up Indianapolis defeated Toledo, 6-1.

In the only other game played Minneapolis won a slugfest from the Kansas City Blues, 10-9.

The Brewers' big inning came in the fourth when they scored four runs. The big blow was a two-run homer by Nanny Fernandez, which blasted the Saints' starter, Charlie Samaklis, off the mound. Milwaukee remained one-half game ahead of Indianapolis.

Bob Malloy, Indianapolis right-hander, scattered 10 hits in going the route against the Toledo Mudhens. Malloy had a shutout until the last of the ninth inning, when the Mudhens pushed over their lone tally.

Minneapolis was leading Kansas City, 8-1, at the end of six innings, but the Blues scored five runs in the seventh and three more in the ninth to take the lead.

The Millers came right back, however, and scored two runs in their half of the ninth to take the game. Minneapolis scored five runs on homers.

Chicago-Mackinac Entries Set Sail

CHICAGO (U.P.)—Sixty-two boats set sail today in the world's longest fresh water yacht race, from Chicago to Mackinac Island.

The largest fleet in the 50-year history of the event crosses the starting line at 1 p. m., with the last group of boats getting off at 2:15.

The first yachts are expected to reach Mackinac late Monday. The tail-enders should arrive the next day.

The race is divided into two sections, the cruising division, with 50 yachts, and the universal division, with 12. Boats entered in the cruising division compete for the Chicago-Mackinac Trophy, those in the universal for the older Lake and St. Ignace.

Last year's winners were both on hand today to try to repeat their performances. L. L. Karas of Chicago and W. J. P. of St. Ignace.

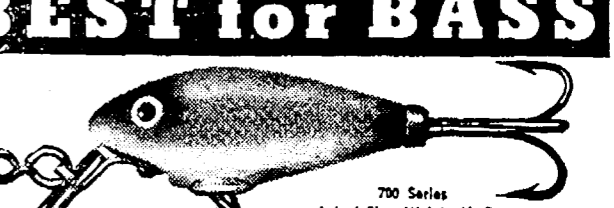
