Noted Baptist Leader to Talk

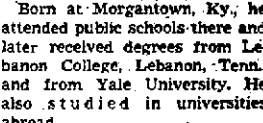

Former Pastor at South Gate

Friends of Rev. Ray Charles Jarman, former pastor of First Christian Church, Huntington Park, will be pleased to learn that he is now pastor of a growing new Christian Chapel in South Gate, organized by him a short time ago. The church services were begun and are still being held in the Vogue Theater, 9325 Long Beach Blvd. The new congregation began with a charter list of 750 adults and it now numbers 900. A choir of 75 singers has been organized and through volunteer effort is today a completely vested choir. In the absence of proper music accompaniment, a Baldwin organ has been purchased and installed and a velvet curtain background for the pulpit has been purchased and hung.

Bishop Moore Dies at Dallas

DALLAS, Texas, July 31. — Bishop John M. Moore, retired, who was one of the leaders in the unification of the three branches of the Methodist Church, died last night at his home here. He was 81.



Bishop Moore had been in ill health for some time. Born at Morgantown, Ky., he attended public schools there and later received degrees from Lebanon College, Lebanon, Tenn., and from Yale University. He also studied in universities abroad. He became a licensed minister in 1887, and came to Dallas as pastor of the First Methodist Church in 1902, leaving in 1906 to become managing editor of the Christian Advocate at Nashville, Tenn. He became a bishop in 1918.

Methodists Plan Musical Program

The pastor, William Harrison Myers, will speak briefly on "The Spirit of St. Stephen."

Sermons Based on Christ's Healing
