Stassen Endorses Ball's Campaign for Reelection

SOUTH ST. PAUL, — (U.P.) Harold E. Stassen has endorsed Joseph H. Ball for reelection as United States senator from Minnesota. Stassen's action ended months of speculation that he might dump the senator he appointed eight years ago when he was governor of the state. A widening divergence of views between the two had led observers to consider the possibility.

However, although extending his support to the man he termed "an able and courageous senator," the unsuccessful candidate for the Republican presidential nomination emphasized a hope Ball eventually would change his mind on some issues over which he and Stassen have disagreed.

Stassen also pointed out that "every seat will count" toward piling up a Republican majority in congress to work "with the Republican president."

Stassen's endorsement came after filings for state and national office closed and the possibility of Gov. Luther Youngdahl's seeking Ball's seat ended with the governor filing for reelection.

Bottle-Type Feeding Tried on Calves

FERGUS FALLS, Minn.—(U.P.) In Otter Tail county, they are making "bottle babies" out of calves and saving money, labor, butterfat and grain.

Dr. H. J. Larson, Fergus Falls veterinarian, knew that nursing calves cut cows' paying production to nothing. He also knew that letting calves drink from bottles often resulted in "pot-bellied" calves and sometimes resulted in scours (dysentery) and pneumonia.

Larson rigged a contraption that consists of a large nipple on the end of a tube connected with a pair of milk. He placed the nipple in a frame at under-height for the calf, which nursed the mechanical "mother" instead of its true mother.

Some 200 farmers who have tried the method claim it means the calves develop better than feeding from their own mothers.

Railroad Tunnels Made Into Mushroom Farms

MERCED, Calif.—(U.P.)—Many people thought C. C. Kellogg was making a bad deal when he bought 16 miles of right-of-way of the old abandoned Yosemite Valley railroad.

Now, however, Kellogg heads a new company called the Mushroom Tunnel farms.

The 16 miles of railroad he bought included four concrete tunnels. Kellogg converted the tunnels to house mushrooms.

The tunnels are 24 feet high and the temperature inside varies between 58 and 60 degrees, which is ideal for growing mushrooms. Trays of mushrooms are set along the tunnel floor and eventually other trays will be built in bunk-fashion toward the ceiling.

Underground water seepage keeps the humidity at the proper level, Kellogg said.
