Q. Will an alien who is living in the United States be required to register for the draft? M. M. A. The Selective Service Act requires that every male citizen of the United States and every other male person residing in the United States who is between the ages of 18 and 26, at the time fixed for his registration, or who attains the age of 18 after having been required to register, shall be liable for training and service in the armed forces of the United States. This means that aliens must register.

Q. Under the present federal income tax law may a person who earns \$300 a year be classified as a dependent? Is the exemption for a dependent \$500 or \$600? E. H. P. A. A person is not classed as a dependent if he earns \$500. However, he is not subject to income tax unless he earns \$600. The old restriction of \$500 to determine dependency is still in effect.

Q. How many species of insects can be found in an average back yard? A. J. M. A. Dr. Frank Lutz of the American Museum of Natural History undertook to find out how many species of insects he could collect in his back yard. He lives in a suburb of New York City and his yard is only 75 by 200 feet. In that small area he observed and collected 1402 species of insects.
