Eight Ivy League football games, by Yale, Harvard and Princeton, will be covered by DuMont's television station WABD this fall, according to a sponsorship agreement with Lucky Strike cigarettes. The complete schedule has not yet been announced.

Passing Show

Betty Field, star of "Dream Girl" and many other stage and screen successes, will star in Thornton Wilder's provocative Pulitzer Prize play, "The Skin of Our Teeth," which will open at the Westport Country Playhouse Monday night, for a week's engagement. Author Wilder has agreed to take over the role of "Mr. Antrobus" in his own play for the Westport engagement, which is happy news for county playgoers who still remember vividly his appearance as the "Narrator" in his play "Our Town" at the Country Playhouse during the summer of 1946.

Featured in the large and brilliant supporting cast, which will activate Mr. Wilder's dialogue and situations are Fania Marinoff (Mrs. Carl Van Vechten), Guy Spaul and Richard Hepburn (brother of the film star Katharine Hepburn).

Miss Field made her first appearance at the Country Playhouse in the first feminine role of Lynn Riggs' "Green Grow the Lilacs" (from which "Oklahoma!" was adapted by The Theater Guild). Since then she has been enormously successful on both stage and screen. Among her more notable films have been "Flesh and Fantasy," "The Great Moment," "Tomorrow the World," and "The Southerner," with Zachary Scott. Aside from "Dream Girl," recent stage appearances have been in "The Voice of the Turtle," "Two on an Island," "Flight to the West," "A New Life," and "The Primrose Path," among others. In private life Miss Field is the wife of the noted playwright, Elmer Rice, and makes her home in North Stamford. The role of "Sabina" in "The Skin of Our Teeth" gives Miss Field a wonderful opportunity for the display of her talent for high comedy, and with Mr. Wilder essaying one of the meaty roles in his own play, there is a distinct treat in store for playgoers at the Westport Country Playhouse next week.

TWO MEN INJURED IN 'CYCLE CRASHES

Two men were recovering in hospitals here today after they were thrown from motorcycles they were riding yesterday. Theodore Panchok, 44, of 973 Maplewood avenue, received chest injuries at 1:30 p.m. when police said, he lost control of his 'cycle on Fairfield avenue at Grove street and was hurled to the pavement after it swerved and struck the curb. He is under observation in St. Vincent's hospital. His condition is reported to be "good."

Policemen Felix Brudzinski and Joseph Vassas said Mr. Panchok was driving his motorcycle out of a driveway at the motor cycle bureau and made a wide left turn, striking the curb on the north side of the street. The second motorcycle mishap involved William O. Granville, 26, of Greene Farm road, Westport, who told police he was thrown from his 'cycle at 5:30 p.m. yesterday after the vehicle struck a dog on Pequot road, near Center street, Southport.

The dog, a collie, owned by C. C. Merrifield, of 688 Pequot avenue, Southport, was killed. Mr. Granville is under treatment in St. Vincent's hospital for a laceration of the right hip, arm and shoulder. His condition is reported to be "good."

PRISONER RECAPTURED AFTER FLEEING FARM

Louis Bevilacqua, 26, of Bridgeport, who was sentenced to a year in jail June 26 for a "mugging" robbery here, was back in the Fairfield County jail today after he walked off the jail farm in Easton shortly before noon yesterday and his bid for freedom terminated two hours later on Housatonic avenue. Bevilacqua, a trustee, was seen entering a liquor store by Lieut. Frank X. Jablonski after a police alarm had been broadcast. Lieut. Jablonski notified headquarters and continued to keep the escaped prisoner under surveillance. Andrew L. Miller, deputy jailer, arrived on the scene a few minutes later and with the aid of Lieut. Jablonski and Motorcycle policeman William Wichinski placed Bevilacqua in custody.
