Midwest Television
Network Starts Sept. 20
CHICAGO—(UP)—The National Broadcasting Co. (NBC) will begin regular programs Sept. 20 on a six-station Midwest television hook-up, it was announced today.

I. Z. Showerman, vice-president in charge of NBC's central division, said the company hoped to merge the six-station net with its eastern network by Jan. 1.

The stations signed into the midwestern network are KSD-TV, St. Louis; WWJ-TV, Detroit; WTMJ-TV, Milwaukee; WSPD-TV, Toledo; NBK, Cleveland; and WBN-TV, Buffalo, N. Y.

Most of the programs will originate in St. Louis and Detroit with a minimum service of 12 hours of

programming each week in the early stages.
Some programs also will originate from Toledo.
Later, NBC's station WNBQ at Chicago will become the hub of the net. Coaxial cables will carry programs from all points except Chicago, Milwaukee, Detroit, and Toledo where micro wave relays will be used.

NEW YORK—(UP)—Celebrities who dabble in painting as a hobby will have their work shown this fall by the Associated American Art Galleries.
Frank Sinatra and Mary Margaret McBride will be representatives of the radio field. The latter will display a painting called "The Old Home Place," which she completed recently in the studio of the artist Neysa McMein.
Noel Coward will have a seascape, Clifton Webb a still life, Bill Robinson will contribute "Dancing Shoes," and those playwright collaborators, Howard Lindsay and Russell Crouse, have combined to turn out a masterpiece called "The Most Beautiful Scene in the World." Others who will be represented in the display include Toots Shor, the restaurantier; Mrs. Vincent Astor, Louis Calhern, Joan Crawford, Van Johnson, and Margaret O'Brien.
The exhibition in New York will be from Sept. 27 to Oct. 13. On the latter date the paintings will be auctioned off for the benefit of the Urban League. Later the exhibit will be shown in leading cities throughout the country.
