Q. How many stars did Gen. Pershing wear at the time of World War I? G. B.
A. Up to Oct. 3, 1917, Gen. Pershing wore three stars, subsequent to that four stars.

A. In May, 1941, Winston Churchill made this comment in regard to the flight of Rudolf Hess from Germany to Scotland.
Q. Is the peanut a nut or vegetable? S. H. L.
A. The peanut is a legume rather than a nut. It belongs to the same family of plants as beans and garden peas and is therefore a vegetable.
Q. How long has it been since the President of the United States personally signed government land patents? N. C. D.
A. Until June 17, 1943, the law required the Presidential signature on transfers of public land to private ownership. Actually no President has signed these patents since 1834 when a law was passed authorizing President Jackson to appoint a person to sign his name. Various provisions of law since that time have provided that designated persons sign the President's name. Under the new law the Secretary of the Interior may delegate his authority to sign the patents "in the name of the United States" to assistants in the department or its bureau.
Q. Will the United Nations staff for the September meeting of the General Assembly in Paris be taken from Lake Success? P. N. M.
A. The United Nations staff at the General Assembly in Paris will number about 1300. About half of these will come from Lake Success and the other half will be hired in Paris.
Q. Where are the lines, "All are architects of fate," found? T. F. C.
A. The lines beginning "All are architects of fate" are from stanza 1 of "The Builders," by Henry W. Longfellow.

McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

The lessons in bridge are many and varied, but the most important one of all is to learn to count your tricks. It is around this principle that many other lessons in bridge are built.
In today's hand, for example, there is the question of re-entries, but unless you count your tricks, you are apt to slip up on the hand.
Declarer played dummy's ten of hearts on the opening lead, West won with the king, and gave up the idea of returning the heart suit. He led back the ten of diamonds, trying to knock out the diamond ace. North put on the jack, East the king and dummy's ace won the trick. Now if declarer could successfully finesse the spades, he could count five spade tricks, a heart, a diamond and two clubs.
But suppose that the spade finesse did not work, how then would he get back into his hand to take the heart finesse? He was almost sure that East had the queen of hearts, as East undoubtedly had led his fourth best and West had won the trick with the king of hearts.
The best line of attack was to hope that the king of spades was wrong. Declarer's first play after winning the ace of diamonds was to cash the king and queen of clubs and then lead the three of spades from dummy. If West went in with the king, the pack of spades would become an entry. If West did not go up

with the king, declarer would win the trick with the jack and return the nine of hearts. East would refuse to cover, so declarer would play the eight of hearts that he had carefully saved in dummy. Then he would take another heart finesse. The seven of diamonds would put West in and now he must either lead a club to the ace or a spade into the ace-queen. Thus, counting your tricks and watching your entries gives you nine tricks.
