"I'm glad he's on his way. From what his mother said, I was afraid he would be stuck on the ranch for another year with no progress in his schooling. How did he manage to win his father around to let him go?"

"He didn't. While his father was away, his two brothers got together and cooked up this scheme for him to go. They said that two boys caught in the snare of bigger and better farming were enough, and that this one should have his chance. He's to work for board and room, and his brothers will pay his tuition."

"I simply don't get it, Isabelle. Here's a man who has money to buy tractors, combine harvesters, and prize cattle, but who never has a penny to spend when his boys want to continue their education. And it isn't as if they were dumb boys. They are unusually bright."

"Why should Sandy have to work for board and room? That would be all right if his father couldn't afford anything better. But there's no denying that a job will interfere with the boy's studies and social life. It's a great deal to expect of a lad to earn his own living and carry a full college schedule. Either his health or his college career will suffer. Probably both."


"She resisted him as long as she could. She knew it would mean shouldering old chores that they had long since given over. "Then there are the children who never saw their own fathers because they were killed in the war. Their mothers remarried and the child has a new father. It is always best to let the child know this even when he has been given his new father's name. Too many people know his history to keep the secret safe."

"For such children some token of their father's being should be about their room—picture of him, some personal belongings, so that the child learns, almost unconsciously, that he had a father other than the one he knows. This saves him from unnecessary shock and allows him to stand on firm ground in family relationships."

"And the children whose father is in jail. If that can be kept from them it is better so, but there is usually some possibility of hiding the fact. In my case, it is not to be told them until they are old enough to understand the situation and to find comfort and strength in other sources. Such children need acutely the friendly help of understanding men who, to the degree in their power, replace the fatherly care they miss otherwise. Life spares nobody, not even children, but we can with loving sympathy and understanding spare them some things."
