Q. What is considered a good average walking speed when walking for exercise? R. I. A. Seventy steps a minute is considered to be a good speed for a beginner. This is equal to approximately two miles an hour.

Q. Is there a simple way to remove the strong leathery odor from a handbag? B. M. B.

A. To remove a strong odor from a handbag, the Department of Agriculture suggests the use of a piece of charcoal, not the powdered form but the lump type, used by tinsmiths. This is also an excellent means of removing musty odors from closets.

By WILLIAM E. MCKENNEY THE new code of bridge laws, which will be put into effect on Oct. 1, will be known as the International code and undoubtedly will be adopted throughout the world. As I told you in yesterday's article, there are no scoring changes and none of the changes will affect party-bridge. Below, in question-and-answer form, I am giving some of the important technical changes in the new laws:

Q. What is the penalty for exposing a jack or higher while the bidding is in progress? A. The partner of the offender is barred from the bidding for one round only. Declarer no longer has the option of calling the opening lead.

Q. If the player ahead of me bids four spades, and I bid two diamonds because I misunderstood and thought that he bid only one spade, what happens under the new laws? A. You have made an insufficient bid. If you correct it to five diamonds, which would be the lowest sufficient bid in the same suit, there is no further penalty. However, you may substitute a pass for your insufficient bid. If you do, you are subject to two penalties. First, your partner is barred from further participation in the bidding on the hand. Second, if your side becomes the defending side, declarer may require or prohibit the opening lead of a specified suit.

Q. If I am dummy, am I allowed to tell my partner if he is about to lead from the wrong hand? A. Under the old rules you could not do so, but under the new rules you may warn your partner that he is about to lead from the wrong hand without penalty.

Q. If the wrong defender makes the opening lead, can the declarer require the proper opening lead to lead any suit? A. That was true under the old laws, but under the new laws the erroneous lead may be treated as a penalty card, which means that it must be played at the first opportunity except, of course, that you must follow suit if you can. Under the new laws, declarer cannot call for the lead of a particular suit by the correct leader, but he may forbid the lead of the suit incorrectly led.

Q. Does the "revoke" law remain the same? A. The penalty for a revoke is still two tricks, but the law has been softened. There is now no penalty if the revoke is corrected before you or your partner plays to the following trick. Of course, the defender's exposed revoke card becomes a penalty card.
