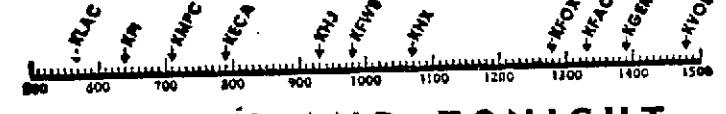

Last Speech by Roosevelt Is Recalled

Q. What was President Franklin D. Roosevelt's last public address? P. E. C. A. The President's last public address was his speech of March 31, 1945, in behalf of funds for the American Red Cross. At the time of his death he was preparing an address to be delivered on Jefferson Day, April 13.

Q. Is Adele Garrison's serial, "Revelations of a Wife," still being published? J. E. A. This newspaper serial begun in 1915 is still being written by Adele Garrison, who is now 75 years of age. It has been called the world's longest story and has run to an estimated 10 million words.

Q. What is the distance between the coast of Newfoundland and the coast of Ireland? J. G. E. A. The distance is approximately 1,875 miles. Newfoundland is the nearest North American land to Europe unless Greenland be considered a part of North America.

Q. Have the English always used the broad "a" pronunciation? R. B. A. The broad "a" apparently did not become general in England until late in the 18th century and was probably due to the influence of David Garrick, who was regarded as one of the greatest actors on the English stage.

Q. What abbreviations of state names are approved by the Post Office Department? A. They are as follows: Ala., Ariz., Calif., Colo., Conn., Del., Fla., Ga., Ill., Ind., Kans., Ky., La., Mass., Md., Mich., Minn., Miss., Mo., Mont., N. C., N. Dak., Nebr., Nev., N. H., N. J., N. Mex., N. Y., Okla., Oreg., Pa., R. I., S. C., S. Dak., Tenn., Tex., Va., Vt., Wash., Wis., W. Va., Wyo., Idaho, Iowa, Maine, Ohio and Utah are not abbreviated.

Q. Is one end of an orange sweeter than the other? E. McD. A. The blossom end of an orange is sweeter than the stem end.

Q. Are there any notable American poets of today who have made a financial success of writing poetry? A. Only about one-third of the people of the world can be regarded as affiliated with one or other of the organized religions, and even with respect to these there are wide margins of uncertainty.

Q. Are ice and snow injurious to bicycle tires? V. B. T. A. According to the National Bureau of Standards, cold weather, snow, ice and icy water have no deleterious effect on bicycle tires. As a matter of fact, tread wear is much lower in winter than in summer.

Q. What is the Curzon Line? E. L. W. A. The Curzon Line was the provisional eastern boundary for Poland, established on Dec. 3, 1919, by the Supreme Council of the Allies. It was named for Lord Curzon, who headed the British Foreign Office after World War I.

MONEY IN GHOST WRITING

I REMEMBER reading in a pocket magazine that something like 20,000 people in this country make their roasts beef and room rent as ghost writers.

According to this article, most of these nameless Neds and Nelles do their stuff for books, magazines and newspapers, but there are also several thousand who make up speeches for businessmen and politicians who are long on lungs but short on brains. And then there are those rarer wraiths who ghost-write briefs for lawyers.

Let me tell you about one of these faces on the court room floor and how it got there. Marvin Jackson—I'll call him that out of deference to his wife, kids and income—occupies a shoe box of an office in downtown Manhattan, and his string of important clients would reach from Sixth Ave. to the Supreme Court—if they thought they could get away with it. He is as anonymous as a ghost, and he explains why. "I'll have to flashback a decade to the days when Jackson was a lawyer-lobbyist in Washington, and was tabbed as a gent who knew his stuff and, more important, the right people.
