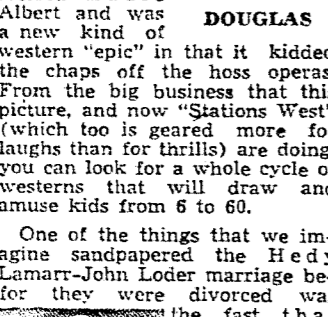

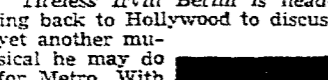

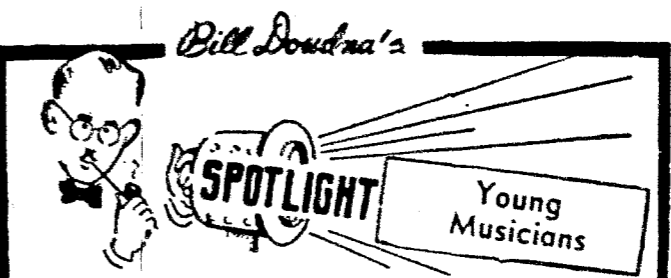

Wisconsin's young musicians will have another chance to win scholarships this fall in a competition sponsored by the Wisconsin Federation of Music Clubs...

This will be the sixth annual contest under the title "Starring Young Wisconsin Artists." Competition will be held in voice, piano, violin, and other concert instruments.

Vocalists' auditions will be held in Radio City, Milwaukee, on Nov. 6, 7, 13, and 14. Instrumentalists' auditions will be conducted there Nov. 13.

Applications should be sent to "Wisconsin Federation of Music Clubs, care of Station WTMJ, Milwaukee, Wis." They must be postmarked not later than midnight, Saturday, Oct. 23.

Auditions are open to any Wisconsin musician interested in radio. Vocalists must be 17 or more, but must not have reached their 31st birthday by Oct. 23.

From among the contestants, 45 will be chosen to appear on WTMJ. From this group, three will be selected to receive scholarships ranging from \$200 to \$500.

CONTEST—Deadline for the submission of manuscripts in a competition of Music Clubs to obtain a composition for orchestra, mixed chorus, and soloist, in religious or patriotic vein, has been extended to Jan. 1, 1949.

Awards to the winner will be \$500 in cash, publisher's readings by Carl Fischer, Inc., and C. C. Birchard and Co., and guaranteed performances by the Denver, Indianapolis, Philadelphia, San Francisco, and St. Louis Symphony orchestras.

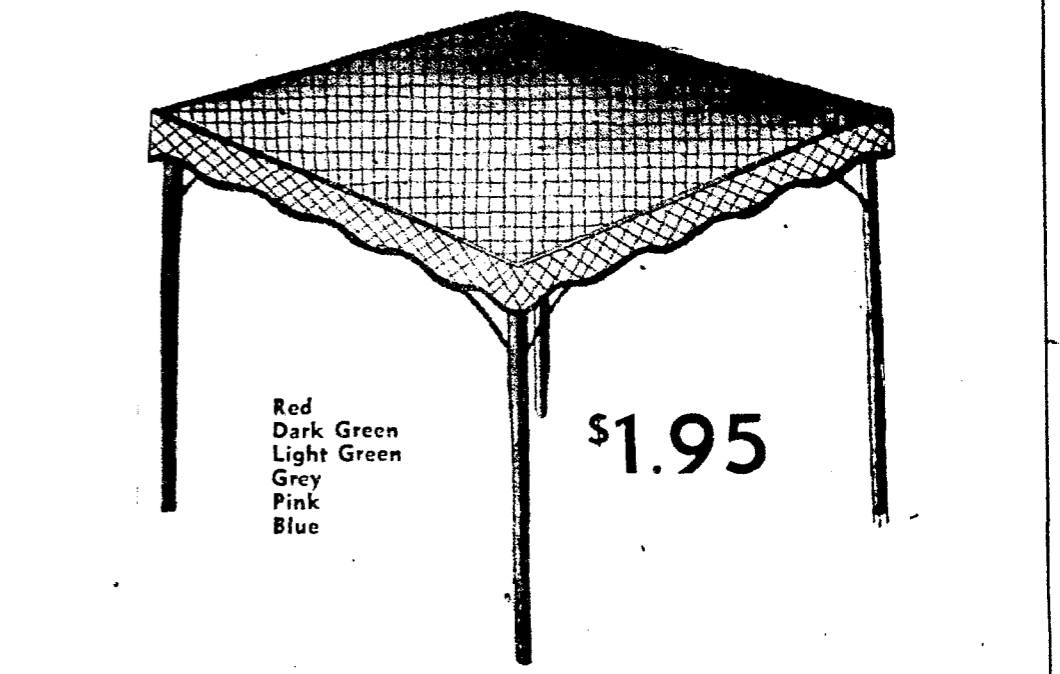

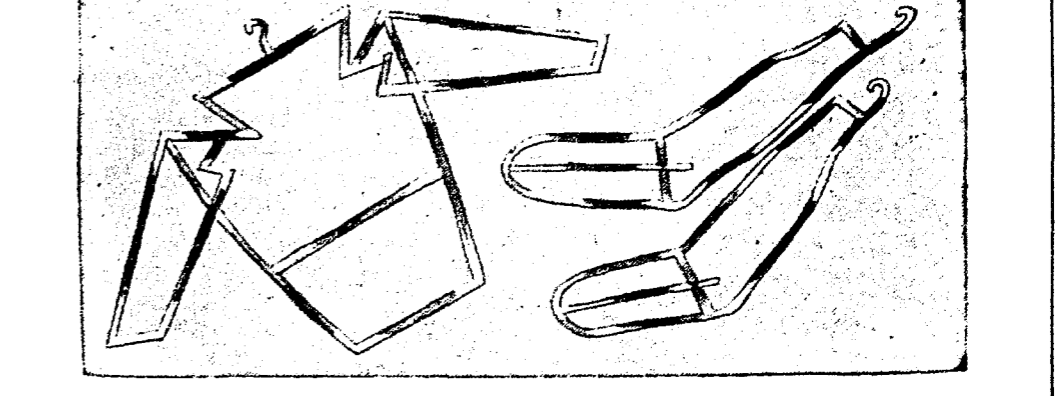
