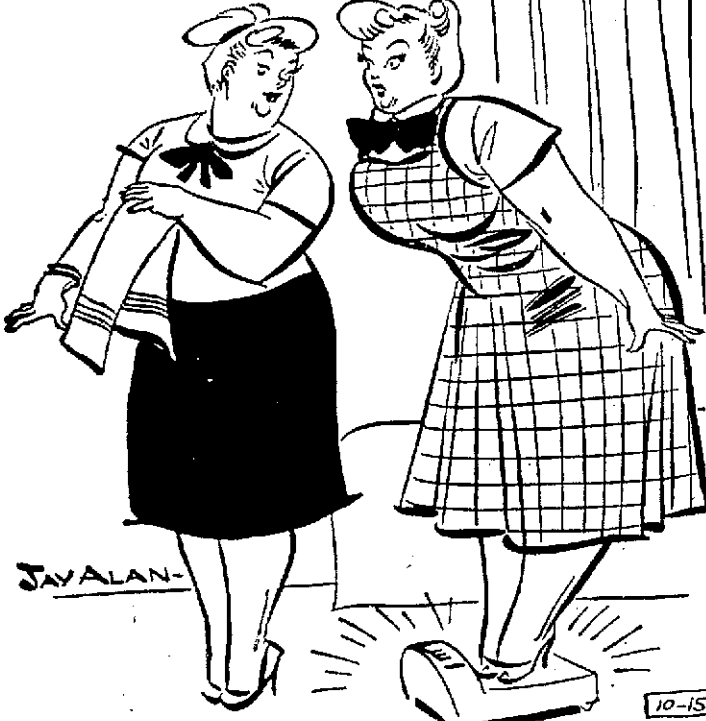

Q. What states now have the most and the fewest inhabitants? A. L.

A. Although some states have had tremendous increases in population since the last census of 1940, New York still has the most inhabitants, according to a Census Bureau estimate of 1947. The population of the state is 14,165,000, a gain of 5 per cent. Nevada, with 139,000, has the fewest inhabitants.

Q. How many times has the Soviet Union vetoed United Nations proposals? A. R. T.

The 27th Russian veto in the United Nations was recorded on Aug. 18, 1948, when Ceylon's request for membership in the Security Council was defeated by a vote of 9-2.

Q. Who were the highest ranking American Army officers ever to be killed in battle? G. C.

A. Lesley J. McNair, lieutenant general in World War II, was one of the highest ranking officers ever to be killed in the front line of an American Army. He died near St. Lo, France, on July 25, 1944. Lt. Gen. Simon Bolivar Buckner Jr. was killed in action by Japanese artillery on Okinawa on June 18, 1945.

Q. Is violin playing likely to develop a callus on the chin? E. J.

A. Although the pressure of a violin under the chin is light it is constant with a professional player, and large calluses may be formed on the under side of the jaw and on the neck where the instrument commonly rests.

Q. What is the proper name for the pinwheel that is currently popular among the younger generation? L. M. T.

A. The small cloth cap topped by two pinwheels is properly called the Atomic Whirler.

Q. Is the treasurer of the United States appointed by the President? S. B.

A. The treasurer of the United States is appointed by the President and serves under heavy bond. Not to be confused with the Secretary of the Treasury, the treasurer of the United States is the official in actual charge of the Treasury's cash, and his name appears on paper currency. The present treasurer is William A. Julian.

FIRST OF THE changes to be remarked on the morning of Nov. 3 will be that peep-pee has suddenly become people.

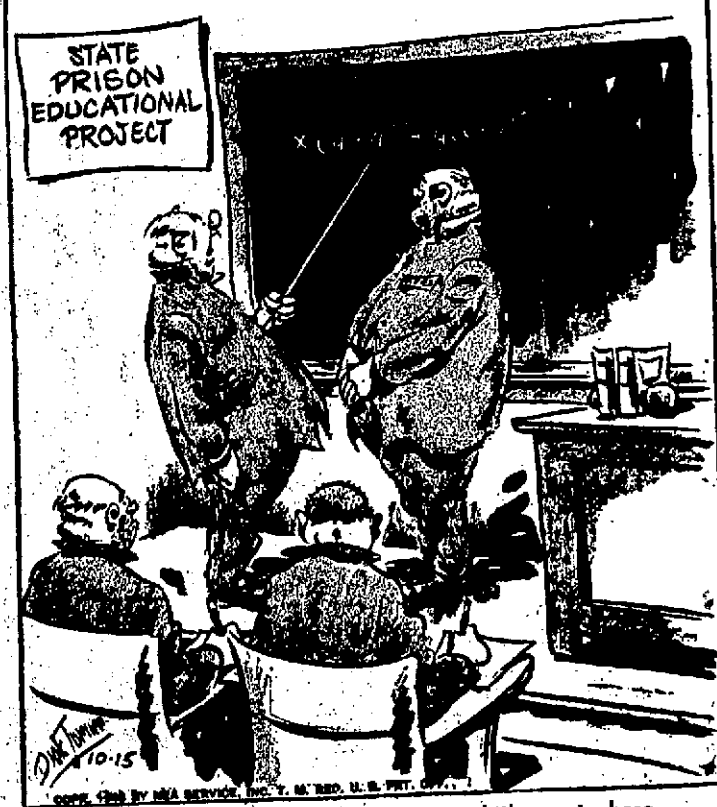

STUDY OF ANOMALY

Short Story Today Offers Two Different Endings

THIS is a story about an anomaly, and an anomaly, in the "deviation from the rule" like a waiter who won't take tips, or a girl who has no use for silver blue mink.

The other day I heard about an anomaly in Brooklyn that sounded like column material, and so I lazed in Flatbush and dropped in to see State Sen. Louis E. Heller. 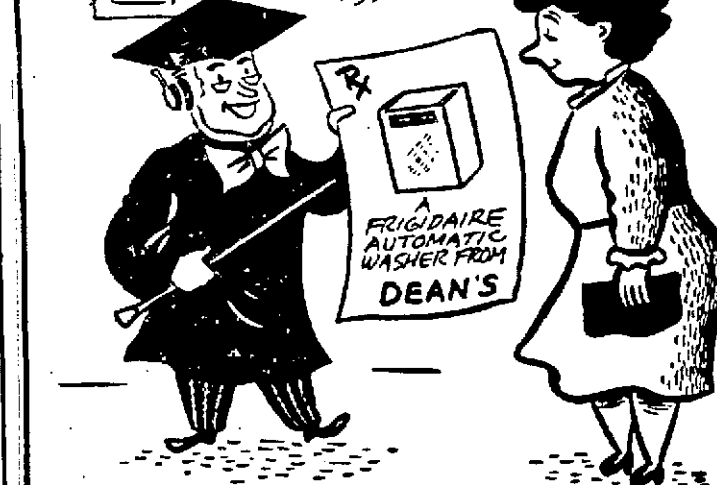
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
