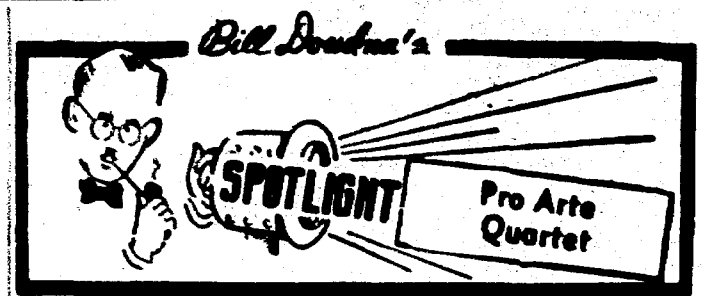

To open its 1848-49 season Sunday, the Pro Arte quartet of the University of Wisconsin chose a pair of contrasting works. The four men played, for an audience of about 1,000 charmed listeners, Schubert's "Death and the Maiden" quartet and Dvorak's "American" quartet.

Both are full of melodies, but there the similarity ends. For Schubert's are flowing, carefully built, heart-warming, and Dvorak's are for the most part, lively and spontaneous. Where Schubert spent two years on his quartet, Dvorak composed the "American" in three days.

The quartet shifted easily from one mood to the other, and gave clearly interpreted and cleanly performed performances of both. There was a healthy regard for the syncopation of Dvorak, as there was a tasteful rather than a sentimental approach to Schubert.

The audience in the Wisconsin Union theater gave equal applause to both, calling the quartet back for two bows at the end of each work.

If any special credit should go to any of the men in this finely balanced group (and this is done only after considerable monologic debate), it must be recognition of the exquisitely executed playing of Rudolf Kolisch, first violinist, in the second movement of the Schubert quartet.

But one cannot overlook the resounding cello background which Ernst Friedlander served up here and in the Dvorak piece, nor the nicely equalized interplay of accompanying figures by Violist Bernard Milofsky and Second Violinist Albert Bahier in the second movement of the "American."

The quartet was to leave today on its first state tour of the season; it will play in Madison again between its return and the spring tour.

Near-Peak Grain Crops Seen in State This Year

All grain crops, except winter wheat, have reached record record peaks this year in Wisconsin, the state department of agriculture said Saturday.

Only in 1945 was grain production greater, but this gain was offset by a sharp dropping of hay production throughout the state, the department said.

The decreased hay production was due to dry weather conditions during the first part of the year.

Estimated corn production will reach 114,525,000 bushels and the second most important crop, oats, will probably yield 124,916,000 bushels, the department said.

Discs of the Day

BORODIN: "Symphony No. 2," recorded by the Chicago Symphony orchestra under Desire Defauw (Victor) . . . A literal translation of Borodin's music, with its pictures of Czarist pomp and Slavie minstrel's songs, merged in the exuberant finale.

MORT COOPER WILL SURRENDER TODAY
HARTVILLE, Mo. (U.P.)—Mort on Cooper, former major-league pitching star, was expected to surrender today to authorities at St. Louis where he is wanted on a charge of passing bad checks.

Sheriff James Baker said he had picked up Cooper Sunday night at his Norwood home and that Cooper had admitted cashing \$300 in worthless checks in St. Louis. Cooper was released when St. Louis officials accepted his promise to surrender today.

Baker said Cooper had expected to sign a contract with an unnamed baseball club and make the checks good when he cashed them in August.

Warrants for Cooper's arrest were issued Friday on complaints of a hotel manager who said he had two \$50 checks signed by Cooper. The big right hander was voted the most valuable pitches in the National League in 1942, when he was with the St. Louis Cardinals.
