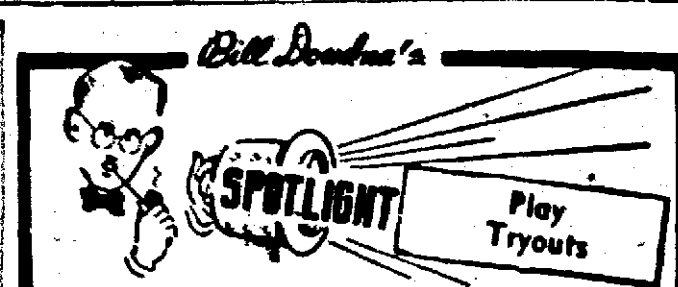

Madison's newest theater group, the Four Lakes Drama League, will hold tryouts for its first production, "Rumpelstiltskin," at 8 p. m. Friday and Saturday in the Community center. Anyone interested is invited, Director Donald F. Voss said.

"Rumpelstiltskin" is a two-act opera for children, with easy choruses, he said. Later, the league plans to produce "Lost Horizon" and "We Shook the Family Tree."

Voss said the group is primarily interested in youth just out of or still in senior high school, although it will accept adults.

CLINIC: Dr. Bjornar Bergeth will be in charge of the annual Mid-Winter Music clinic to be held Jan. 6, 7, and 8 at the University of Wisconsin. The clinic will be sponsored jointly by the Wisconsin School Music assn. and the university school of music.

EDUCATION ASSN.: Leroy Klose, director of music in the Madison public schools, will be chairman of the music section at the Wisconsin Education assn. convention in Milwaukee on Nov. 4 and 5. Walter Heermann, conductor of the Madison Civic Symphony orchestra and Madison Civic chorus, and Prof. Richard C. Church, conductor of the University of Wisconsin Symphony orchestra, will speak at the Friday session.

COMPOSERS: Works of six Wisconsin composers are on the official 1948 music list for Wisconsin festivals, as announced by the Wisconsin School Music assn. They are Joseph E. Skornickia, Milwaukee; Arthur Kreutz, formerly of Madison and LaCrosse; Theodore Mesang, Ashland; the late Guy Holmes, Baraboo; Cecil Burleigh, Madison; and Sybil Hanks, Madison. Ole Bull, Norwegian violinist-composer who once lived in Madison, also is represented.

PIANIST: Claire Richards, new member of the University of Wisconsin music school's faculty, will give an informal recital at the school's weekly convocation in Music hall at 2:25 p. m. Thursday. The convocation will be open to the public. Miss Richards will play "Sonata in F Minor," Ferguson; "Intermezzo, Opus 17, No. 1," and "Capriccio, Opus 114, No. 2," Brahms; "Nocturne, Opus 48, No. 1," and "Polonaise, Opus 53," Chopin.

RADIO: "Johnny Fletcher" gets the ax on ABC after Nov. 21 but the network is preparing a new series for Bill Goodwin, title star. There is so much demand for road appearances by Vaughn Monroe and his orchestra (their CBS Saturday night broadcasts are originating in different cities most of the time) that Monroe will have just one fall and winter appearance in Gotham this year. He opens at the New York Strand theater for three weeks.

ART: Only Wisconsin artist represented in the Pepsi-Cola Co. exhibition, which will make a six-month U. S. tour, is Robert von Neumann of Milwaukee State Teachers college. The show chosen from pictures submitted in the company's fifth annual competition, will be at the Milwaukee Art Institute after its current showing at the National Academy of Design in New York City. Von Neumann will receive a \$100 award.
