

# Crawford Beats Harbor Favorite in Bowl Fight

TWO of the top amateur lightweights in this area slugged and pounded each other for four fast and furious rounds last night in the main event of an action-packed six-bout amateur card at the Wilmington Bowl.

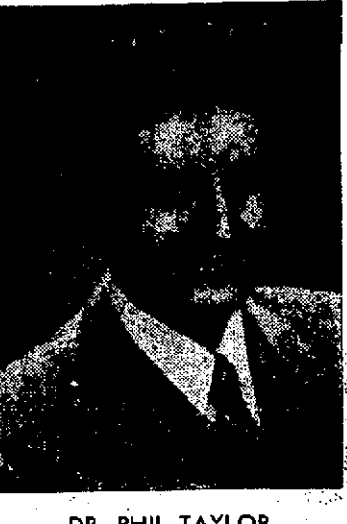

# Action by New Congress Forecast

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6. (AP) The Congress elected Tuesday is expected to give much smoother sledding to President Truman's New Deal program, battered and often ignored by the Republican 80th Congress.

That program is topped by such things as broader Social Security coverage, antidiscrimination bills, public housing, public health insurance and federal aid for education.

All these measures had been opposed in the past by many of the lawmakers who went down to defeat in this week's voting.

Those holdovers who had been influential in blocking the President will be in a much weaker position now, for Democrats will be in control of the law-making machinery.

Opposed in the Senate by the electorate were such opponents of Mr. Truman's legislation as Ball (Minn.), Dworshak (Idaho), Revercomb (W. Va.), Robertson (Wyo.), Buck (Del.), Brooks (Ill.) and Wilson (Iowa).

In the place of these Senators when the 81st Congress convenes next Jan. 3 will be Democrats Douglas (Ill.), Chapman (Ky.), Frear (Del.), Humphrey (Minn.), Gillette (Iowa), Neely (W. Va.), Hunt (Wyo.), and Miller (Idaho).

House casualties included such Republican foes of Truman legislation as Knutson (Minn.), chairman of the tax-writing committee, McDowell (Pa.), a leading figure on the House un-American activities committee; Ploeser (Mo.), chairman of the small business committee; Harness (Ind.), Gearhart (Calif.), Chenoweth (Colo.), Vall (Ill.), Eusby (Ill.), Meade (Ky.), Reeves (Mo.), Effett (Nev.), Bender (Ohio), Gross (Pa.), and several score others.

Taking the places of many of these will be lawmakers who in the past have supported Roosevelt-Truman proposals.

Among them are Woodhouse (Conn.), Ober and Rabaut (Mich.), James J. Delaney (N. Y.), Barrett, Green and Granahan (Pa.), Biemiller (Wis.), Doyle (Calif.), and Bailey (W. Va.).

Others among the newcomers have no past voting records but many of them replaced vigorous Truman opponents.

Through shifting of committee control from Republicans to Democrats, administration supporters will hold the key spots in both the Senate and the House.
