As you undoubtedly remember, there was a bald-headed gent sitting at a ringside table who heckled you several times.

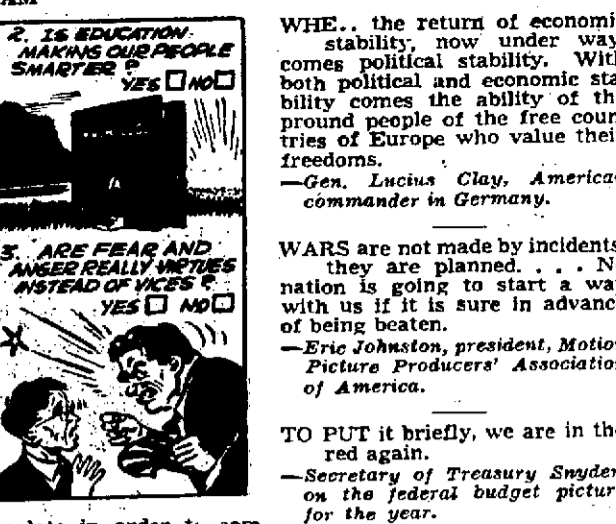
Well, it wasn't much of a contest—it seldom is between the amateur—but when the customer finally paid his check and left, I heaved the well-merited sigh of relief.

But it never was because in Chinatown was a good shot. And that, my dear Henry, is what happened to one comedian who got a little too gay with the customers.

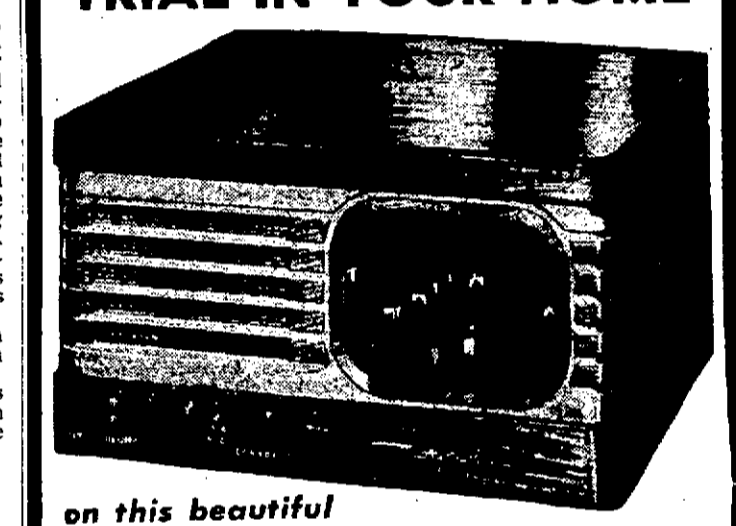

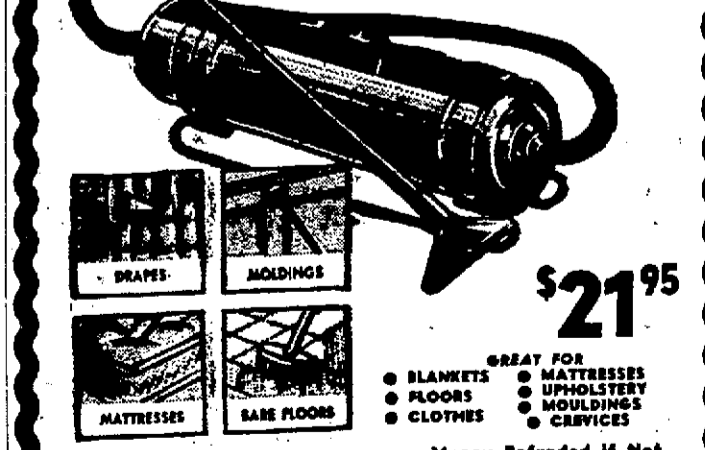

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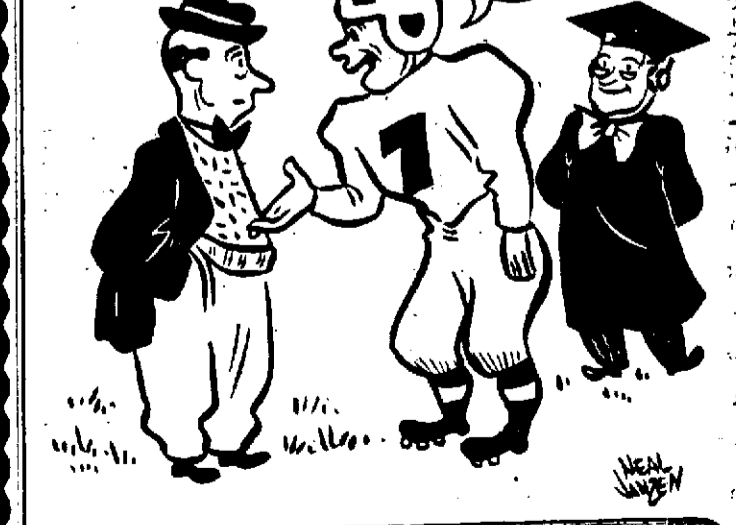
