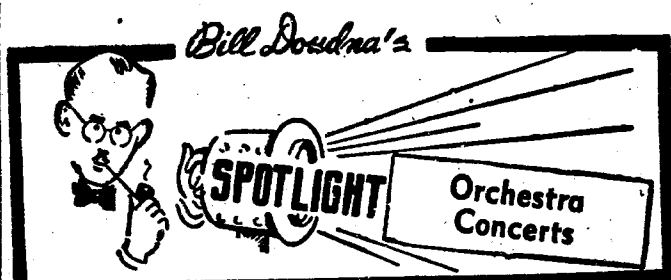

Walter Heertrann will make his debut as conductor of the Civic orchestra in the Masonic auditorium at 8:15 tonight, and Prof. Richard C. Church will introduce the 1948-49 campus organization at 8 p. m. Sunday in the Wisconsin Union theater.

TALENT SHOW: Alpha Omega Phi, new club for young women, will present a talent show at 7:30 p. m. Saturday in the Neighborhood house, 768 W. Washington ave. This will be the group's first major event of the year. Prize will be given for the best performances.

James MacDonald, master of ceremonies, will introduce these performers: Calvin Harris, Robert Brown, and Joseph Washington, singers; Ellen and Lois Waldon, voice and piano; Chester Hobson and Larry Kelliher, pianists; Jerry Miller, Michael Shivers, Joan Tallberg, and Curtis and Jacqueline Tallberg, dancers; Charles Harris baton twirler, and Carl Caruso, imitator.

Pete March and Dave Matson will have the top male parts. DISCS OF THE DAY: On the serious side... Minneapolis Symphony (Columbia): "Fantasia on a Theme by Tallis," Vaughan Williams... Dimitri Mitropoulos conducts a long-needed recording of this work, a beautifully tranquil thing.

Eileen Farrell and Leopold Stokowski Symphony orchestra (Victor): "Five Songs," Wagner... These are the pieces Wagner wrote on Poems by Mathilda Wesendonck. Miss Farrell has a rich voice and a strong dramatic sense, and reveals both here, but her enunciation is muddy.

Polyna Stoska, Herbert Janssen, Torsten Ralf, Herta Glaz, and John Garris (Columbia): "Aria

and Quintet" from "The Mastersingers"; Wagner... Janssen's "baptism" aria is a moving performance, and the quintet is well done, if not perfectly balanced. Chicago Symphony (Victor): "Prelude and Love Death" from "Tristan and Isolde," Wagner... This was recorded during Arturo Rodzinski's regime, and reflects his interest in orchestral depth and drama.

Vronsky and Babin (Columbia): "Waltzes of Tschalkowsky"... Lively two-piano versions of five favorites.

Jose Iturbi (Victor): "June" and "November" from "The Months," Tschalkowsky... Two more favorites, played with grace and emphases on melody.

Orpheum

Tex Beneke's orchestra played "the mixture as before" at the Orpheum theater Monday, with no more than two or three deviations from the program of last August.

Pete Candoli's frantic trumpet was again featured in Pete's arrangement of "Superman with Horn," and the Moonlight Sereaders again ran through the never-say-die arrangements of "Chattanooga Choo Choo" and "Gal from Kalamazoo."

Biggest applause greeted Vocalist Mary Mayo, one of the Sereaders, who did an excellent job on "It's Magic" and "Haunted Heart."

Buddy Yeager, trumpeter and gag-singer, scored another hit with "I May Be Wrong," and Bob Mitchell, another Moonlight Sereader, revealed a pleasing voice in "Night and Day."

Only added act was Petine and Rosa, an acrobatic team. The rest of the show was a repetition of the slick arrangements of the 35-piece band, which the audience, although somewhat smaller than the one which helped break attendance records at the Orpheum in August, seemed to enjoy to the last note.

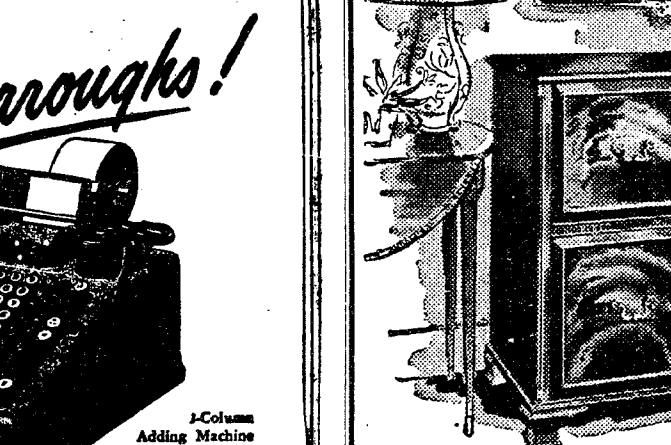
