Q. Is tuberculosis on the increase or decrease in the world?
R. E. N.
A. The general trend of the tuberculosis death rate prior to World War II was downward, according to the U. S. Public Health Service. There are a few exceptions to this statement, notably, for example, Japan and Greece. During World War II, however, the trend was reversed and started upward in the war-torn countries. Latest figures indicate that, as conditions improve in these countries, the tuberculosis death rate is tending to level off and even decrease in a few instances. The tuberculosis death rate in the United States, however, has continued downward before, during and after World War II.
