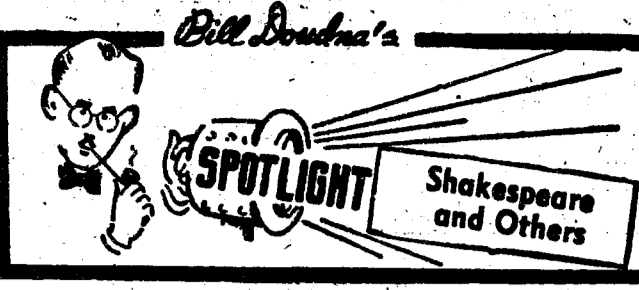
HIDES UNDER BED

When the players arrive late today, Miss Webster will be with them. Another inducement for good work will be sell-out houses; every ticket for the performances has been sold.

Wisconsin art will get a going-over Nov. 30, when five University of Wisconsin professors will take part in a symposium in Great Hall of the Memorial Union.

The subject will be "What Is Wisconsin Contributing to Contemporary Art?" and the speakers will be Keith McGary, philosophy; John Kienitz, art history; Aaron Bohrod, artist in residence; Fred Logan, art education; and Hans Gerth, sociology. The symposium will be held in conjunction with the showing of the Wisconsin Centennial Art exhibition. Drawings and graphics are now in the lobby of the university library; paintings will be displayed beginning Tuesday in the Union's Council room and the Madison Free library. Tickets for the symposium will be available at the Union boxoffice beginning Friday upon presentation of a Union membership or fee card.

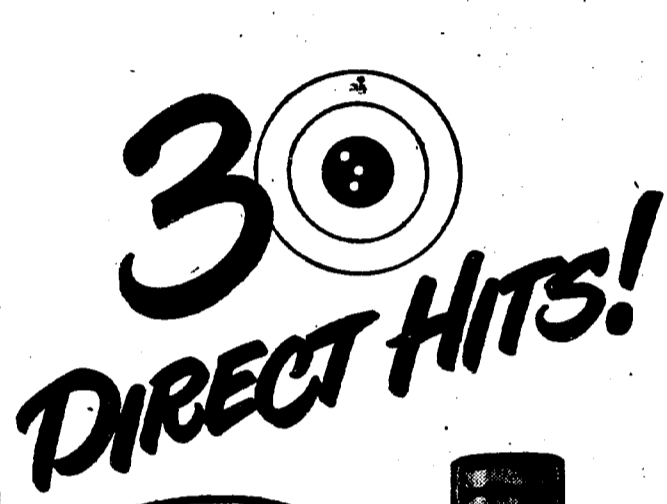

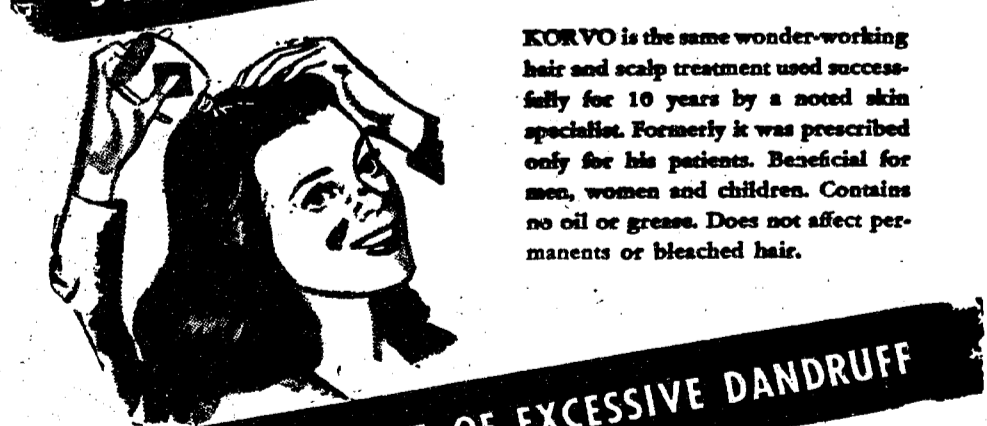
shaking stage shows and movie "Sunday" type of song rag. It's offering out of their hair.

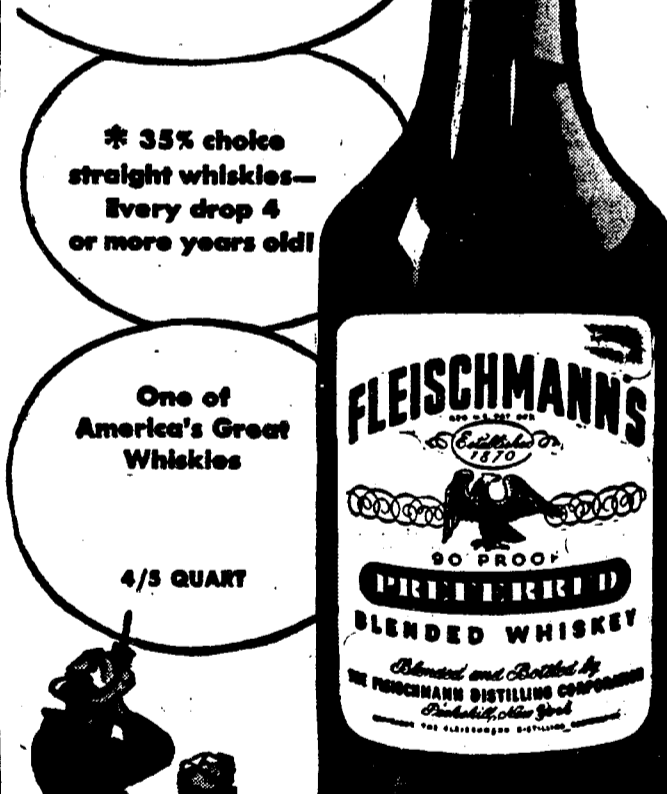
