Grid Gear No Handicap for Davis

Q. What is the record time for a 100-yard run in a football uniform? W. M. A. A. Glenn Davis dashed 100 yards in full football regalia, carrying a ball, over the grass, in 10.8 seconds for the Los Angeles Rams on August 26, 1948. The record had been held by Willie Steele, who made the run in 11.2 seconds in 1942 when he was at San Jose (California) State College.

Q. What was the significance of the expression "waving the bloody shirt"? J. R. F. A. The term "Bloody Shirt" was used to describe attempts in political campaigns (especially 1872-1876) by radical Republicans to defeat the Democrats by impassioned oratory designed to keep alive the hatreds and prejudices of the Civil War period.

Q. Please name some famous people who made recordings on cylindrical records. E. O. A. Such divergent figures as Queen Victoria, Gladstone, P. T. Barnum, Florence Nightingale, and Edwin Booth made the cylindrical wax records, more or less perfected about 1888.

Q. How many species of food fishes are there in the United States? G. H. E. A. About 90 species of food fishes known by more than 160 different names are native to the United States and surrounding waters, according to the Fish and Wildlife Service.

Q. Is petroleum generally measured in barrels? How much does a barrel contain? O. G. R. A. The American Petroleum Institute says that the barrel is a unit of measurement of the United States petroleum industry and probably 80 per cent of the world production is measured in terms of barrels. The barrel contains 42 U. S. gallons which is equivalent to 35 imperial gallons; thus, while the barrel is standard in both Great Britain and the United States, the gallons are different. In Canada, Australia, etc., for example, it takes 6 U. S. gallons to equal 5 British gallons. Motorists traveling in Canada have long observed that Canadian gallons cost more but last longer. In a few foreign countries, principally the U. S. S. R., oil production is occasionally measured by tons or converted to barrels for purposes of international statistics.

Answer to Question No. 1 Yes, Psychologist G. R. Pease, by technical methods, tested the algebra ability of 364 high school freshmen boys and 321 girls in four midwest cities. The boys made 2096 more errors per 100 pupils than the girls. The "average boy" made 163 errors to 142 by the "average girl." When Pease says she "can't learn algebra," let her try to dodge these figures. Answer to Question No. 2 Far more, as shown by Elsie McCormick, describing the Detroit Clinic for reckless drivers. Records prove drivers from 17 to 20, with all the quickness and ability of youth, have twice as many accidents as drivers from 40 to 49, and as high as those from 60 to 70.
