New Book Cites U. W.'s 'Enormous' Service to State. The "enormous contribution" the University of Wisconsin makes to the people of Wisconsin is cited in a new book, "Inside the Campus," by Dr. Charles E. McAllister, president of the Association of Governing Boards of State Universities and Allied Institutions.

Dr. McAllister, who also is a regent of the State College of Washington, surveyed 89 institutions in the United States and reports on them in the book. He writes that the University of Wisconsin "has long emphasized its program of direct service to the people of the state which is one of the program's constructive investigation and direct teaching, designed to keep the university in close contact with the citizens of all the counties."

Dr. McAllister reports that "at present, 26 divisions of the University are devoted to this function. In many ways they profoundly influence the lives of people through health, business, industry, agriculture, and governmental relations."

Examples of this direct service, he says, "include almost every phase of teaching and research."
