Corn Progress is Costly

MILLIONS of dollars worth of corn was lost in northern Indiana, Illinois and Iowa by rotting of the ears in the crib or on the stalk. The cause was a lack of early frosts, which normally would kill the corn plant and prevent mounting and from prevent mounting sap from keeping the grain and cob moist.

Once upon a time corn was cut in the field and the ears would cure in the shock, frost or no frost. Later, sometimes into the bitter winter, the shocks were broken up and the ears husked out by hand. The stalks, cut before frost to preserve their nutrient value, served as stock feed.

rhat procedure passed with invention, and adoption of the mechanical corn picker, which rips the ears from the standing stalks faster than many men could husk the old way. Today's Corn Belt farmer could not begin to handle his crop without the picker, even though with it, in the present instance, he loses to mold and rot.
