Appeal Right for Tenants Asked

Rents Still Climb, Director Woods Says

WASHINGTON, (U.P.) — Rent Director Tighe E. Woods disclosed Saturday he will ask congress to give tenants a right to appeal from general rent boosts passed out by local rent boards.

Landlords, in event they weren't satisfied, would have the same right.

Otherwise, Woods said in an interview, he will ask no change in the system by which local rent boards, on the basis of "sample" reports from landlords, can impose higher rents in a whole area or city.

A United Press study showed meantime that rents, despite Pres. Truman's hope of keeping them down, are climbing steadily. Further increases are in prospect as landlords show that their costs have risen.

A proposed general rent increase for the whole nation has been ruled out by the White House. However, Wilmington, Del., last week became the latest in a group of cities in which general increases have been applied to a total of about 430,000 dwellings.

In addition, about 30,000 individual rents are being raised each month by Woods' local officials. And about 2,100,000 tenants have seen their rents go up—usually by 15 per cent—under "voluntary" leases.

Up 10 Per Cent

The bureau of labor statistics said rents in November continued a slow climb that started after the war. The nation's average rent bill was up 18.3 per cent over a pre-war base period (1935-1939).

Economists in Woods' office estimated that rents on 6,000,000 of the 17,000,000 houses and apartments under control have been either raised or decontrolled.

Under Woods' regulations, there are 14 grounds on which a landlord can petition for an increased rent. Among these are evidence low on the freeze date, and proof that he is not making as much money as he once did.

1,700,000 Adjustments

Since 1942, when rents were frozen, individual upward adjustments have been granted on 1,700,000 homes and apartments.

Woods has been under attack from consumer groups for approving the 14 per cent boost in Wilmington.

He said this increase—like all general increases—was cleared with the White House.
