

Jap Lacquer Failure Laid to Woods

By HASKIN

Q. Why do articles of Japa-ese lacquer deteriorate after eing brought to this country?

A. The Forest Products Laboratory says that articles made from wood, such as carvings, furniture, trays, etc., brought to this country from overseas, are likely to suffer deterioration when placed in heated buildings. are likely to suffer deterioration when placed in heated buildings in our country. The air within our heated buildings is relatively dry, causing the wood to assume a low moisture content. The wood from which the articles are generally made is not seasoned sufficiently to withstand dry conditions. The loss of moisture when exposed to the dry air of heated buildings often results in checking, splitting, results in checking, splitting, warping, and loosening of joints. Such articles should be kept in the coolest part of the house, away from radiators or other sources of heat.

Q. On what American railway trains keep to the left? R. C. S.

A. The Association of American Railroads says that the Chicago and North Western Railway has trains which run on the left-hand track in double-track territory. In tracing the origin of this custom an article in Railway Age states that the popular rumor attributing it to London financiers who refused money for the railroad unless it was run English style is false. The real reason is that the origi-nal stations on the old Galena road happened to be located on the north side of the line. When double-traking of this line was started in 1855 (itself an unusual circumstance), the second track was added to the south of the original pair of rails to avoid moving the stations. But since the main function of the stations was to shelter passengers waiting for trains bound east to Chi. cogo, the management decided to operate its railroad left-handed.
