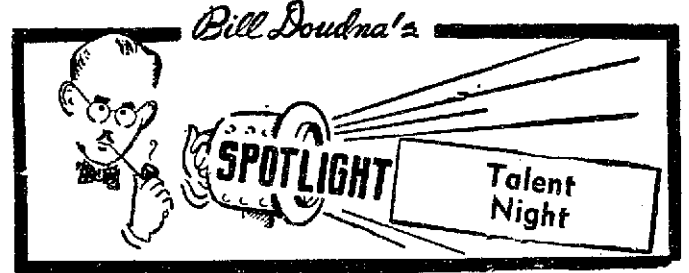


His Wife's on Program, Too
