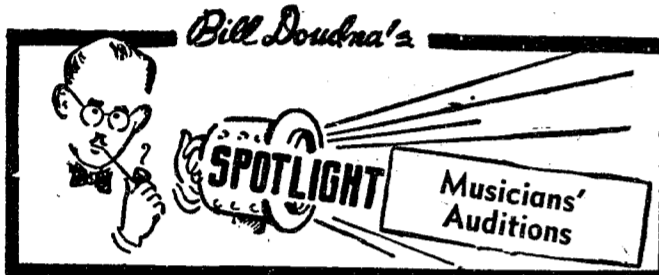


Another Tall One for Rooney

She Wins Court's Praise But Not the \$800 SALEM, Ore.—(U.P.)—Mrs. Laura I. Jackson, a Portland hotel chambermaid, didn't get to keep \$800 she found in a hotel room, but the Oregon supreme court gave her a pat on the back for her honesty.

Mrs. Jackson discovered eight \$100 bills tucked away in the paper lining of a dresser drawer of a room she was cleaning. She reported the find to the hotel operator, Karl Steinberg. After attempts to find the owner failed, Mrs. Jackson demanded the money as hers on the rights of "treasure trove."

After a lower court granted her the \$800, Steinberg appealed and the supreme court said that he must keep the money until it is claimed by the "rightful owners."

To Mrs. Jackson the high court said: "She is to be commended for her honesty and fair dealing throughout the transaction." Steinberg kept the money.
