

Music hall was filled to capacity Sunday night for a superb concert by the Pro Arte quartet—a program marked by high musicianship, impeccable performance, and of all things, a popularly-received playing of a Schoenberg quartet.

George, in the third and fourth movements, to which Schoenberg had given impressionistic settings which, while hard to understand, were nevertheless accurate tonal transcriptions of the lyrics.

As for the quartet—it has never played better in Madison. The group prefaced the main work with a strictly formal one, Haydn's quartet in B flat major, followed it with Beethoven's in F minor, an opulent piece.

With amazing versatility, the quartet sounded as good in one as in another.

It certainly brought to Madison Sunday night a substantial thread with which to find a path through the labyrinth of Schoenberg.

The Pro Arte's next concert will be Sunday night, Mar. 6, in Music hall. A new work by a Madison composer, Prof. Oskar Hagen, is tentatively scheduled.

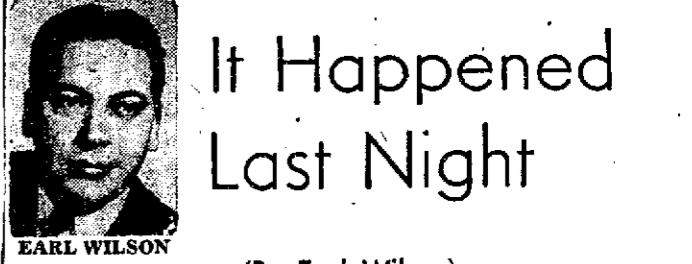
