Iowa Hikes Tuition Fees

University, State College Affected

DES MOINES, Ia.—(U.P.)—Tuition fees for out-of-state students will be increased at the University of Iowa and Iowa State college at the beginning of the 1949 fall term, the state board of education announced Thursday.

The board also announced that only 400 new out-of-state undergraduates will be permitted to enroll at each school during the next school year.

From \$170 to \$200 The limitation will not apply to non-residents now attending the schools. Non-resident tuition at the university will jump from \$170 to \$220 a school year, except for the graduate college and college of medicine.

At Iowa State college, the non-resident tuition will be boosted from \$150 to \$210. In addition, out-of-state students also must pay the registration fees charged to Iowa residents.

This makes the minimum charge beginning next fall \$350 at the university and \$348 at Iowa State. Board Secretary David Dancer said the board feels that the decline of out-of-state enrollment "should be accelerated," although

Carbon Monoxide Dangers Revealed

Watch out for that carbon monoxide during cold weather, motorists were warned late Thursday by R. C. Salisbury, safety director for the Wisconsin motor vehicle department. "Several recent deaths have been attributed to the colorless and odorless gas, and it probably has proved a contributory cause in more wintertime accidents than we realize," the official said. Although the gas cannot be detected by itself, in the exhaust of an automobile it mingles with other gaseous products that have a characteristic odor. Salisbury warned car owners not to warm up their vehicles in a closed garage or run the motor while parked for any great length of time.
