Cooperage **Dates Back** to Antiquity

By HASKIN

Q. When and where were barrels first made? E. M.

A. Vessels made of shaped staves or pieces of wood bound together by hoops were used by together by noops were used by the Romans at the period of the Christian era. Pliny ascribed the invention of cooperage (the making of casks or barrelic of staves and hoops) to the inhabi-tants of the Alpine valleys. It is of great antiquity.

Q. Who wrote: "I had three chairs in my house; one for solitude, two for friendship, three for society?" A. H. D.

A. This is an observation from the chapter, "Visitors" in "Walden" by Henry D. Thoreau.

Q. Do men spend as much money on clothing as women do? H. L. S.

A. Apparently men spend more. The Bureau of Labor Statistics reported that in the 1890s women spent an average of \$40 a year for clothes, and men \$43. As of June 1947, in the cities surveyed, the women workers were spending from \$111 to \$139 and their husbands from \$128 to \$159 a year on

Q. While burning logs from a mulberry tree in a fireplace, the wood frequently gave off violent sparks. Could this have been due to resin? P. A. L.

A. The Forest Products Laboratory says that specific data on the causes of the flying of sparks and the popping noises during the burning of some wood species are unknown. It is doubtful. that resins and sap pockets are responsible because hardwoods contain no resins, and the tendency for spark-ing is greater when the wood is dry. It is more likely that popping is due to the sudden rupture of the wood surfaces as they dry during burning. It has been reported that the flying embers are usually curved toward the outside sur-The sudden rupture of the wood and the release of gases formed during heating might supply the energy required for propelling the embers from the fireplace into the room.




