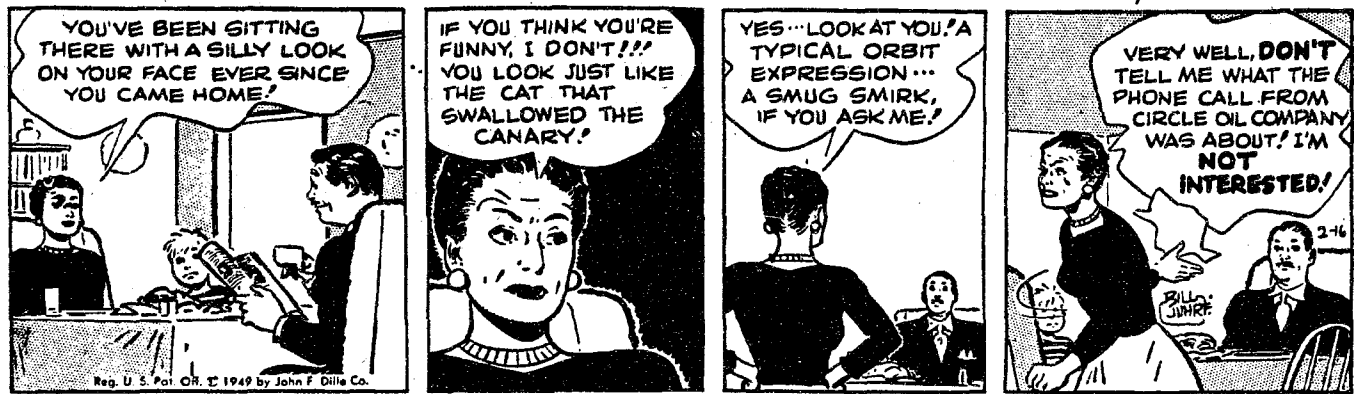

Postal card questionnaires have been mailed to all known registered nurses in Wisconsin by the bureau of nursing education of the state board of health, Ruth Coo, Madison, president of the State Nurses' assn., said late Tuesday.
The survey, to end Apr. 15, is to provide national planners with accurate information on existing and potential resources in nursing personnel. It was requested of the state by the national security resources board.
The project is being sponsored by the American Nurses' assn. The state bureau is lending its facilities for the work.
