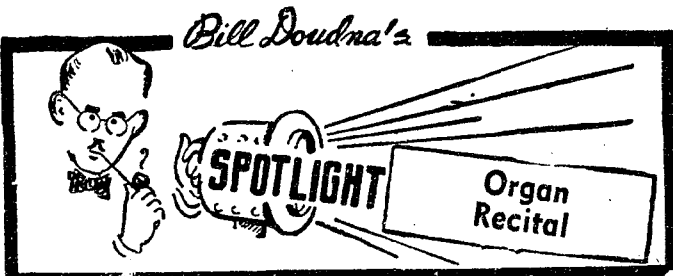


One Jester Crowns Another

ernize the quarantine, placard and isolation regulations of the state board of health, Sen. Oscar W. Neale, (R-Stevens Point), touched off a heated discussion when he asked why chiropractors were not permitted to care for those isolated by communicable diseases.

The secretary of the Wisconsin Chiropractic assn., W. C. Jacobs, declared that it was "not American" to leave chiropractors out when there "might be cases in which they could treat the disease."

Atty. Robert B. Murphy, representing the State Medical society, called Jacobs' statements "misleading and absurd." He said chiropractors have "no qualifications in bacteriology or immunology and related fields—in fact they even deny the existence of these subjects and the germ theory of disease."

Final action was postponed pending a rehearing on amendments.
