Answer to Question No. 1

More feminine, Stanford psychologist E. K. Strong, has developed a scale to measure how much you like or dislike 420 different things: people, bugs, dogs, dancing, music, skating, novels, poetry, famous men and women, etc. This gives him each one's "interest pattern," or "like and dislike pattern." In general, the feminine pattern is quite different from the masculine pattern. But as men and women grow older, they both develop more toward the feminine pattern of interests, likes and dislikes. So women get their way in the end—as usual.

Answer to Question No. 2

No, although they nearly always help. The only thing that will give us good government is developing a trained personnel, in every branch, who are above self-interest or bribery. Some states and cities, and the U. S. government, have gone a long way in developing efficient Civil Service. This has not resulted from reform waves, but by psychologist L. J. O'Rourke, and others, developing tests of intelligence and aptitude for each branch, even sorting mail on trains.

Answer to Question No. 3

We have only "collateral evidence" to answer this but psychologists find that "attitudes," whether reasonable or unreasonable, are a part of your personality. They enter into your pattern of life. They are chiefly the outcome of your effort to uphold your own ego, your personality picture of yourself. A person who strongly believes Negroes are "all shiftless and dishonest" and Jewish people all "selfish money makers" etc., is almost certain to be violently anti-Catholic, or anti-Baptist and almost everything else. So the unreasonable person in politics is likely to be the unreasonable partisan person about roasting children and home life generally.

For the World's Children

THE DECISION of Secretary General Lie to lend his special consultant, Col. Alfred G. Katzin, to the Children's Fund to reorganize the world-wide Appeal for Children gives ample proof that U. N. wants action on behalf of the needy children of the world. For Colonel Katzin is a man of action who believes in the Appeal and feels that, given the wholehearted endorsement of the United States government, it "could surprise even the optimists" with its results.

The need for a positive and fearless approach to the children's problems was never greater. For while the need has been eased in some areas through the pumping in of ECA funds and similar aid programs the needs of some 200,000,000 children on two-thirds of the earth are continuing and terrifying. Only unflinching devotion to this cause by

the people of the world can bring them physical and psychological health — and, indeed, make the world of tomorrow safe for our own children.

That is why the Children's Fund, which is conducting vital feeding operations for a limited number of children—fewer than 5,000,000—should be wholeheartedly supported in order to expand its work. Welcomed throughout the world wherever it is reaching children with nourishing food and medical aid, it must surely be clear that our Government has a responsibility to back the Appeal this year to the hilt. One of Colonel Katzin's first duties will be to ask officials for open and unqualified support. Without it the campaign would be sunk before launched. — New York Times.
