Caged Bird Foot IIIs **Explained**

By HASKIN A reader can get the answer to any question of fact by writing the Long Beach Press-Telegram Information Eureau, 316 Eye St., N. E., Washington 2, D. C. Please inclose three (3) cents for return postage.

Q. WHAT CAUSES the feet of caged birds to become sore?

A. Sore feet, an annoying trouble that occurs commonly among caged birds, usually is caused by the perches being too small, smooth, dirty or wet. Perches should be scraped, not cleaned with water. If the birds are given ample space for exercise and plenty of chance to bathe, sore feet should not appear. Another cause is lack of gravel on the bottom of the cage, or gravel that balls up and sticks to the bird's feet.

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
