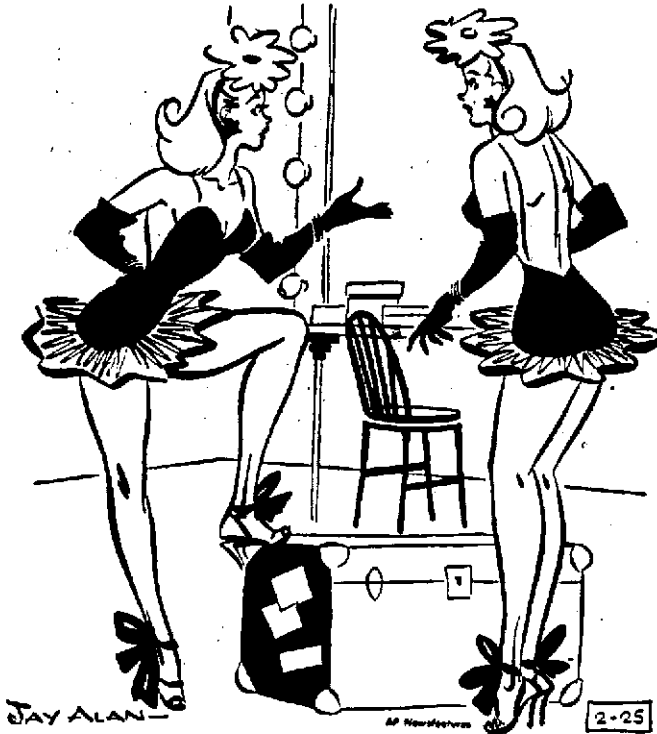

ANOTHER LOS ANGELES? About Booms and Bookies on Florida's Gold Coast

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) America might just as well start considering now whether it should secede from Florida.

If it doesn't if may end up with another Los Angeles in its borders.

For that is what some natives here fear—and I use the word advisedly—that South Florida's Gold Coast is turning into, yes, a second Los Angeles.

The whole area is still riding high in the saddle of the post-war boom. You have to know the beaches to get a hotel room.

The beaches are so packed with hard-core ladies seeking a tan that the sand is becoming pale and anemic. It isn't getting enough sunshine itself.

Hotels, apartment houses, stores and homes go up almost overnight. The communities strung along the shoreline are thickening like a muscled arm.

They are filling up with people—and people who have come to stay.

"The way things are going now the whole 70-mile stretch from Palm Beach to Miami will be one continuous city," complained one resident.

"In 10 years the Gold Coast will be another Los Angeles.

are better, and that the plush gambling palaces scare away more visitors than they attract.

One unexpected development in the current anti-gambling drive: A wife sued her husband for divorce on the grounds he was a bookie, and another wife, charged her mate tossed away the family dough in bookie joints.

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When Senator Doesn't Sit

WHAT SHOULD A STATE do if one of its two Senators becomes too ill to serve and yet does not resign his seat? This question is puzzling citizens in New York, whose 72-year-old Sen. Wagner has not appeared in the Senate since May 27, 1947.

There can be no question as to the eminent record which Wagner has compiled in his nearly 22 years in the Senate. He sponsored the National Labor Relations Act, which is generally called the Wagner Act, the Social Security Act, the Federal Housing Act, and the Railroad Retirement Act, and the National Industrial Recovery Act.

Yet there are other factors. The 14,386,000 people of New York now have only one effective Senator, Irving M. Ives, and since he is a Republican, he is in the minority.

Writing in the New York Herald Tribune, Robert J. Donovan finds the situation bound up in national, state and local politics.
