by armies since Roman times. In the first crusade they were employed by the Saracens, but the crusaders soon learned to intercept messages by sending falcons, trained to kill, after the pigeons. The French used them in the Franco-Prussian War and the Germans used hawks to catch them. Thousands saw service in World Wars I and II. Only the homing pigeon is now used as a messenger.

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
