Tests made by a Kenyon college speech research unit show that people cannot help shouting when they are shouted at, even though they may not see the facial expression which accompanies the shout.

A group of students were asked a series of single questions, each at different degrees of loudness. Their answers came back soft or loud, in keeping with the questioner's voice. The students were then told how they reacted and asked to answer the questions with uniform loudness. No matter how hard they tried, their voices varied in the same pattern as the questioner's.

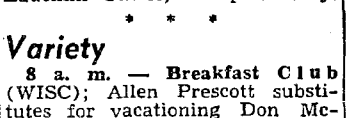

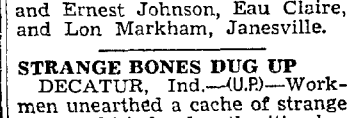
