Q. IS SIBERIA a political subdivision of the Soviet Union?—L. E. R.
A. Siberia is not a political subdivision. It is merely the geographic name that has long been used in reference to the soviet and area of the Soviet great land area of the Soviet Union which lies east of the Ural Mountains in Asia.


