Senate Recesses Final ERP Vote

Resumed Today; Curb Move Loses
 WASHINGTON (AP) — Administration leaders abandoned efforts to force a final vote Tuesday night on the \$5,580,000,000 European Recovery Program (ERP).
 After threatening to hold an all-night session if necessary to dispose of the "second installment" of European aid authorization, Democratic Leader Scott W. Lucas of Illinois called for a recess at 9:04 p. m. (CST).
 He did so after Sen. William Langer (R-N.D.) had first blocked an attempt to limit debate and then held the floor for nearly two hours with a desk-thumping attack on American policies in Western Germany.
 In moving for a recess until 11 a. m. today, Lucas noted that Monday when he called a night session he had promised his colleague it would wind up about 10 p. m.
 A number of amendments still remain to be acted upon before the senate can vote on passage of the bill.
 Earlier, administration forces defeated a series of proposals to tighten the reins on the spending of American billions by the 16 Marshall plan countries of Western Europe.
 However, by voice vote, the senate adopted an amendment directing that half of U. S. aid supplies be shipped abroad in American vessels.
 With administration forces riding high, the senate suddenly picked up speed after 10 days of lagging debate on Pres. Truman's request for a \$5,580,000,000 "second installment" of European recovery funds.

In rapid succession, the senate rejected these proposals:
 ONE. An amendment by Sen. Jenner (R-Ind.) which would have required Marshall Plan Administrator Paul G. Hoffman to buy only American farm commodities when there is a surplus in this country or farm products are selling at low prices. The vote was 48 to 32.
 TWO. An amendment by Sen. Ellender (D-La.) to forbid the use of so-called Marshall Plan "counterpart funds" for the payment of interest, administrative expenses or retirement of national debt by the beneficiary nations. On this, the vote was 55 to 27.
 THREE. A second Ellender amendment which would have required American aid countries to set aside at least 25 per cent of the "counterpart funds" to stimulate the production of critical materials needed by the United States. The vote was 56 to 22.

With support from Chairman Connally (D-Tex.) of the senate foreign relations committee, the chamber adopted an amendment by Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash.) that 50 per cent of American-aid supplies be shipped in American ships—a move designed to aid the U. S. merchant marine against low-priced foreign shipping.

Building Permits Total \$179,895

Madison building permits issued last month numbered 139, representing a value of \$179,895, Building Inspection Supt. Ray F. Burt reported Tuesday.
 The number exceeded the 129 permits issued in March, 1948, but the value was only about half of the \$349,980 represented in permits for the same month last year.

Last month's business included 16 single-family homes, \$104,520; eight private garages, \$2,900; one detached, \$75 residential additions; alterations and repairs, \$32,820; 29 non-residential additions, alterations and repairs, \$37,750; and seven fire escapes, \$1,550.
