Territory, **Possession Explained**

WHAT IS THE distinction between a territory and a possession? M. E. P.

A. The difference between a territory and possession is really a juridical difference interpret-ed by the courts. The Constitution of the United States has been extended to territories by an act of Congress. The Constitution of the United States has not been extended to possessions by an act of Congress.

Q. Please give some informa-tion about the Lost Dutchman Mine in Arizona.

A. The Lost Dutchman Mine is

said to be located on Supersti-tion Mountain, which is a collection of crags, pinn-cles and can-yons on the edge of the desert in Arizona, about 32 miles east c Phoenix. The mine is named for a Dutchman who used to come to Wickenburg periodically, drink until his money was gone and then disappear, only to return later with large bags of gold. A monument has been erected on which is a bronze plaque reading: "Here lie the re-mains of Snowbeard, the Dutch man, who in this mountain shot three men to steal a rich gold mine from Spanish pioneers, killed eight nen to hold his treasure, then killed himself in 1892, without revealing its location. Dozens of searchers have met mysterious leath in the can-yons there, yet the ore lies un-revealed Indians say this is the curse of the thunder gods on white men in whom the craving for gold is strong. Beware, lest you, toc, succumb to the lure of the Lost Dutchman mine in Superstition Mountain."




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
