Quart Holds 15,360 Drops of Water

By HASKIN A reader can get the answer to any question by asking it. The answer to the question "How many drops of water are there in a quart?" is 15,360 drops.

Q. WHAT VOLCANOES besides Paricutin in Mexico have come into existence within our historical period? E. S. T. A. Notable examples are Paricutin, also in Mexico, which began to build up a cone in 1953, after three months of earthquakes and subterranean noises. Recent volcanoes include Novarupta which appeared in 1912 in a valley in Alaska, two volcanoes in Belgian Congo and Chinyera which erupted in 1909 on Tenerife, one of the Canary Islands.

Q. How many drops of water are there in a quart? D. F. A. There are 15,360 drops (minims) of water in a quart.

Q. Is there any danger of the body's obtaining too much aluminum as a result of eating foods cooked in aluminum saucepans? E. T. A. Rather extensive studies have shown no evidence of aluminum poisoning from amounts in excess of those which would ordinarily be ingested. It has been estimated that on the average a human being eats approximately one ounce of aluminum in six years. About half of this occurs naturally in the foods; the remainder is dissolved from the cooking utensils.

Q. When was Delmonico's, the celebrated New York restaurant, established? B. W. X. A. Delmonico's was established about 1834 by Lorenzo Delmonico (1813-81), a Swiss who came to the United States in 1832.

Q. What is the second largest island in the United States, Long Island, N. Y., being the largest? G. R. T. A. Whidbey Island in Puget Sound is the second largest island in the United States. It belongs to the state of Washington.

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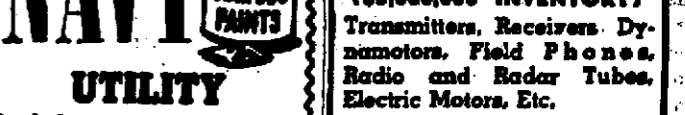
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AUNT HET
