

must be accomplished under
conditions which will permit of
the entrance of air at a slow
rate. Wood is porous and permits the evaporation of the
liquid from within and the exchange of gases, especially air. liquid from within and the ex-change of gases, especially air, from without. In a solution such as wine, containing water and alcohol, the slow diffusion of air through the wood permits mild oxidation to take place in the wine, which is desirable. Too rapid oxidation results in a flat rapid taste and in real flat rancid taste, and in red wines, a brown discoloration.


