A. The election of McKinley in 1896 was hailed as a landslide though he only received 51 per cent of the popular vote. In 1920 Harding received 60.3 per cent to Cox 34.2 per cent; Hoover, in 1928, 58 per cent to Smith's 40.7 per cent; and Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1932, 54.7 per cent to Hoover's 39.7 per cent. Roosevelt set a new all-time high in 1936 when he received 60.7 per cent to Landon's 36.4 per cent. don's 36.4 per cent.


