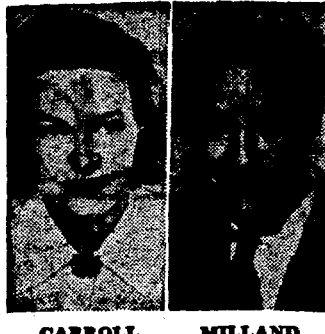
On the Records
