# Bill to Reorganize State Department **Waits House Vote**

WASHINGTON, May 7. (27) A bill to reorganize the State Department as suggested by the Hoover Commission awaited House action today after being passed by the Senate.

The main feature of the measure is a provision for 10 Assistant Secretaries of State instead of the present six—a move intended to free the Secretary and Undersecretary from burdensome

iended to free the Secretary and Undersecretary from burdensome details so they can devote more time to foreign policy.

The bill differs only in minor respects from the reorganization plan submitted by the 12-man commission headed by former President Herbert Hoover. Secretary of State Acheson was a member of the group.

approved yesterday by the Sen-ate expenditures committee. It would put all government "house keeping" agencies into one cen tral office.


## San Pedran **Plunges Off** Dock, Drowns
